TO REPLANT PINE
IN BURNED AREASLarge Shipment of Young
Trees Sent to Santiam
Forest This Week

C. C. Hall supervisor of the Santiam Forest left for Detroit today where he sent some ten or twelve men yesterday to begin work on what is known as the Brittenbush Area in planting several thousand evergreen trees under the Re-forestation Act of the government.

They are to plant the first shipment of about 34,000 white pine and Noble fir trees which have been grown in a nursery and will be planted in areas where the timber has been destroyed by fire or on tracts that have never supported a growth of timber. The policy of the government is to maintain a growth of timber on all its lands for the future generations. Other shipments of trees are expected

in the near future to be planted on the most favored open lands.

University Has Large Enrollment

University of Oregon, Eugene, October 8.—Registration of students in the University at the end of the first week of the term totaled 1510, the largest figure for the opening week in the history of the institution. The total is already two-hundred more than the record enrollment for any previous college year, and from present indications the registrar's office expects a total of more than 1800 on the campus before the end of the present term. President Campbell's estimate of the total for the year, including summer school and Portland's extension enrollment is 3200, or approximately 1,000 more than the highest previous figures.

Of the total already enrolled, 200 are ex-service men taking advantage of the state's offer of \$200 a year while in college. The number applying for this state aid was 330, indicating that many more may be expected to enroll during the term.
