There are good many days still to come before Halloween is with us again. But children are already on the job thinking up practical jokes and Halloween stunts.

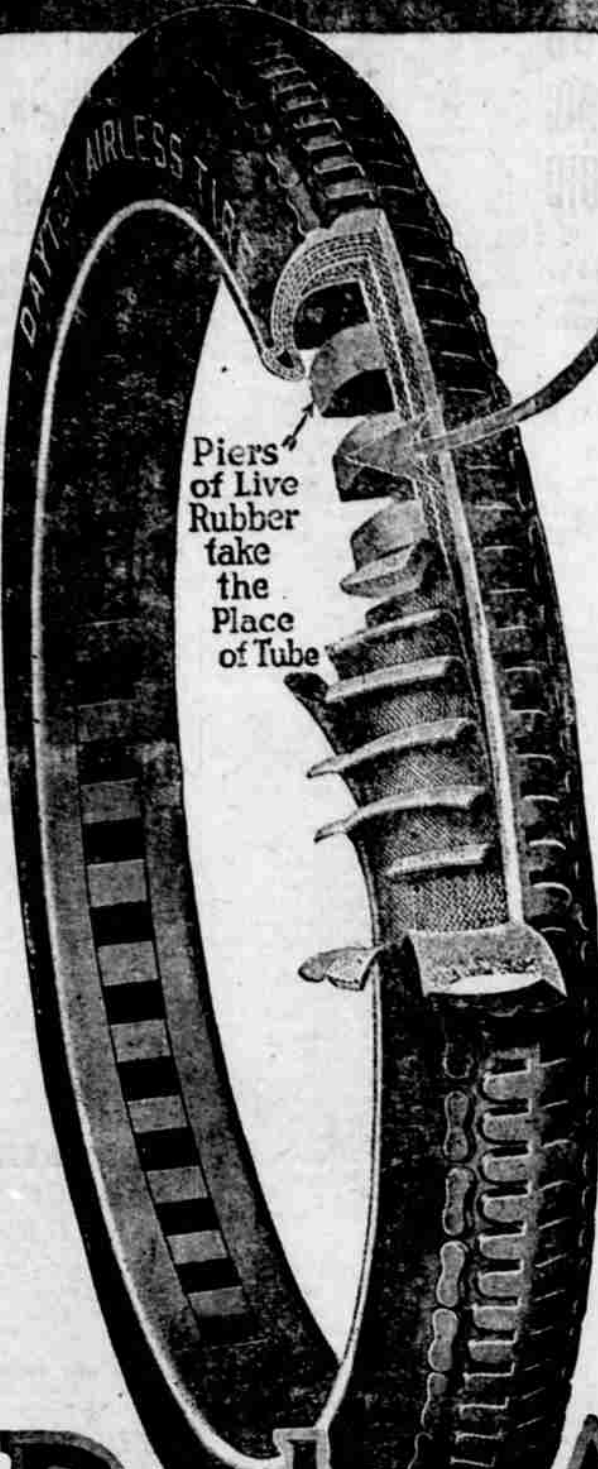
