British Land 50,000 Letts to Aid in Recapture of Riga; Esthonian Come to Aid; Germans Deny Helping Soviets.

2 REGIMENTS TAKEN

Bolshevik Organizations Captured Intact by Gen. Glazennapp; Bermott In-Letts and Esthonian to Confer.

Copenhagen, Oct. 13.—By A. P. Col. Araloff-Bermott claims today to have checked the Lettish attack on the left flank of his Russ forces.

May Attack Riga Paris, Oct. 13.—Important troop movements occurring in the direction of Riga today.

Four Regiments Surrender London, Oct. 13.—In the capture of Yamburg, Gen. Glazennapp is reported to have captured four complete Bolshevik regiments and 2,000 other soviet troops.

Germans Deny Aid Berlin, Oct. 13.—Official denial was today issued by the German government that German Baltic troops have aided the Bolsheviks and attacked the Letts from the rear.

Col. Bermott said the purpose of the proposed conference was "to prevent further bloodshed and bring about joint action against the Bolsheviks."

COL. HOUSE, ADVISOR TO THE PRESIDENT IS TAKEN ILL TODAY AND TAKES TO BED

Wilson's Condition Unchanged Today; Physicians Depreciate Rumors that President Cannot Attend to Duties.

MIND IS CLEAR

Prolonged Period of Rest and Quiet Necessary to Restore Vigor; Long Session at Paris and Strain to Blame.

New York, Oct. 13.—By A. P.—Col. E. M. Houst, President Wilson's personal advisor and closest outside intimate of the chief executive, remained in bed here today following his arrival yesterday from France, where he has been on official business.

Wilson's Condition Unchanged Washington, Oct. 13.—The President's condition today remains much the same as during the past several days, said a bulletin issued by his physician, Admiral Cary Grayson and consulting physicians.

White House officials resented publication of reports that the President's condition was such that he could not attend to his official duties.

D. Grayson said today he would continue to stand on his bulletins alone and would not discuss rumors concerning Wilson's condition.

THE 2500 SOCIETY PRACTICAL SUCCESS

Mutual Association Founded by Late Dr. Hill Has Interesting History

"The 2500" was organized in March 1901, by a number of citizens of Albany and vicinity for the purpose of furnishing a mutual benefit insurance to its members at the least possible expense.

When a member dies an assessment of \$1.00 is levied on each member, and when this money is collected, it is paid to the beneficiary of the deceased member.

During the 18 years and six months of its existence "The 2500" there have been 164 deaths, and the total amount paid in death benefits amounts to \$179,625.00.

The late Dr. J. L. Hill was one of the founders of the Society, and was president from its inception until his death. The present directors are J. W. Ellison, D. O. Woodworth, W. M. Parker, J. J. Collins, C. H. Burgraf, William Fortmiller and Conrad Meyer.

Judge Kelly has sent a letter to each of the school districts of the county asking permission to permit solicitors to collect money for the cause through the schools.
