**THE PEACE TREATY**

Never in history has a great subject been made the football and shuttle-cock of aspiring politicians as has the peace treaty and the league of nations covenant. Carping critics of the administration have been setting up a howl against certain parts of the pact and some of them have carried their vehement denunciation to all parts of the country.

At the bottom of Senator Hiram Johnson's traveling attack is his aspiration for the republican nomination for the presidency. In Portland the other day when he was asked to make a statement on the subject he replied that he was not interested in that subject just now. Of course not. But wait until after the treaty controversy is settled in congress. Then it will be seen how interested he is. And he is being aided and abetted by Lodge, Farness, Poindexter and sundry other stand-pat republicans, all for the sake of party politics.

There are a few democrats who are voicing protests, notably Senator Reed, of Missouri, who was egged on by an audience recently in his home state. What Reed's motives are is hard to surmise.

But thinking men and women of all parties are solidly behind the treaty as it stands, and politics with them does not count when it comes to settling a great principle. The making of the treaty consumed about six months of the hardest kind of work and required the most patient tact and diplomacy to settle with any degree of satisfaction all of the conflicting claims and aspirations of the many countries involved in the peace settlement. It is acknowledged the best that could be made and the fact that President Wilson is acknowledged the dominant figure in the conference is guarantee enough that America's interests are well looked after.

The league of nations is taken as the principal object of attack and there are many who would separate it from the peace treaty or keep America out of it altogether. A year ago the general cry was for just such a document, and while American blood was being spilled upon the battlefields of France and Belgium there was none who would not say that some sort of an international agreement and armed force was not the proper thing to place future wars at a minimum. When Senator Lodge at that time was in favor of it. But because it happened to be a democratic administration that is charged with making the settlement, he is opposed to it now.

We would much rather judge the opinions of such people as William Howard Taft, Alton B. Parker, Herbert S. Houston, Herbert Hoover, John Barrett, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, John Bates Clark, Samuel Gompers, William C. McAdoo, Oscar S. Straus, Henry W. Taft, Henry Van Dyke, George W. Wickersham and other notables, besides the vast majority of the American press, both republican and democratic, than the biased critics who set themselves up to destroy the peace of the world and set to naught the work of the whole conference as far as America is concerned. A rejected treaty means a separate peace with Germany, and in what shape is America now to negotiate a separate peace with the Hun?

Coming closer to home we find all three of Oregon's metropolitan newspapers strongly in favor of the league—The Oregonian, The Journal and the Telegram, not to mention the scores of others throughout the state. Edgar B. Piper, editor of the Oregonian, spent several weeks in Europe and on the battlefields and knows what he is talking about. He is for it.

Murray Wade, one of Oregon's best known cartoonists and free lance newspaper men, has established a new magazine at Salem with the purpose of boosting Oregon. He calls it the Oregon Magazine, and searches the entire state for his material for publication. The magazine is issued monthly and supplies a splendid medium to attract the eastern settler. There are many interesting stories and articles in the first number.

The manner in which the \$100,000 road bond issue was taken up by Linn County speaks highly for their progressiveness. Besides keeping the interest in Linn County, the action of these men and women in subscribing for the local road bonds shows a splendid faith in the county and a worthy attitude towards better roads.
