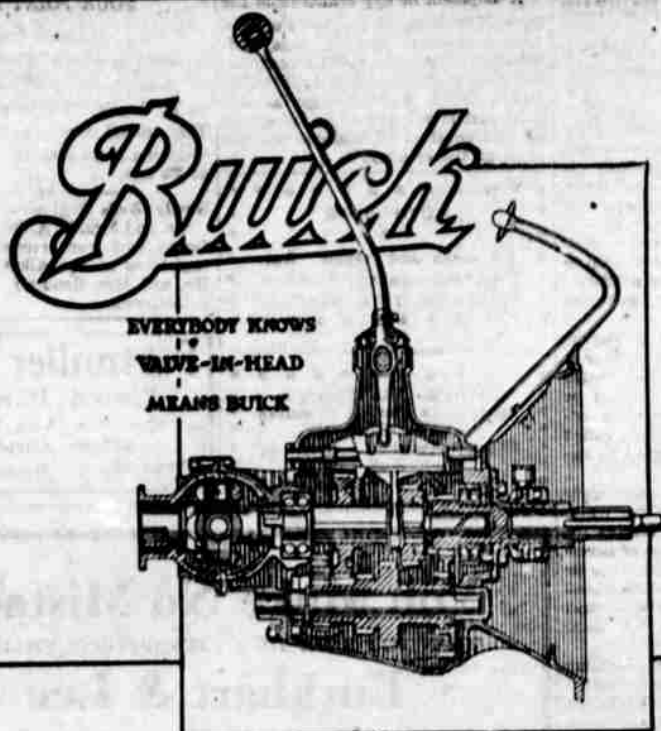




The Buick Built Transmission

The sliding gear type of transmission is used on Buick cars because of its strength, convenience and quietness of operation.

Three forward speeds are provided, so that the motor speed with relation to the speed of the rear wheels may be instantly adjusted to meet any conditions that may be encountered, such as putting the car in motion, driving in deep sand, heavy mud, on steep grades or ordinary roads. It requires only a slight movement of the lever to shift the gears.

The speedometer drive is enclosed in the transmission, thus eliminating all toggle joints and gears from the front axle.

All gears run in a bath of oil, the universal joint at the rear of the case being automatically lubricated from the same source, the oil from the transmission case entering the universal joint through the rear bearing.

LINN COUNTY FAIR BOARD IS NOT ALL AGREED ON PLANS

Returned Funds Indicates That Sufficient Interest Is Not Taken in Fair

Speaking of the meeting of the Seio Fair board the Tribune points out that the Albany delegates brought no definite proposition with them but submit the offer. The Tribune says: wanted the owners of the plant to "It was expected that the Albany fair promoters would come to the special meeting of the fair stockholders with some definite plan anent the transferring of the Linn County Fair from Seio to Albany. But the representatives had no plan. They wanted Seio to make the proposition when, as they wanted the fair transferred to Albany it was their duty to place the proposition in some definite form.

"There is a division of opinion among Linn County Fair stockholders whether they favor removal of the fair to Albany or not. Yet the fact that a part of the state appropriation was returned to the state treasury because all the classifications were not filled is evidence that our local people are not taking the interest in the fair they should.

"Dr. A. G. Prill, R. Shelton and E. C. Peery were appointed a committee to confer with the stockholders of the Linn County Fair, and should a

majority favor the transfer, then to formulate a plan and offer to submit to the Albany people.

"It is generally believed that \$5,000 will be necessary for Albany to raise to get the franchise. This will give them the present fairgrounds (20 acres) with a mortgage of \$850 thereon, all of the fair property, the franchise and appropriation from the state of from \$1600 to \$1700 and the general good will of the people of Seio and vicinity.

"When Albany had the Linn County Fair it was permitted to die for lack of support. Let us hope that if they again secure the Linn County Fair franchise they will give it the support the enterprise merits and make the Linn County Fair the banner fair of the state."

Her acting was all that could have been desired. Hayden Stevenson, as the husband who doesn't know very much about angles and got extremely jealous through the fear of his wife, carried his part to perfection. The husband, bent upon winning a fortune and ease for the sake of his wife, learns that there is

something more than just business, although this lesson happily comes in just as he closes the deal that makes him independent and leaves him with his fortune and the inclination to spend it in company with his wife.

Mr. Hackett demonstrated his right to be included in the list of America's most popular players. His work is easy and graceful and highly artistic. The repeated curtain calls by the audience gave proof of the ardor of his reception here.
