A TRUE COMMUNITY CHURCH

It might be considered that a rural district stretching over into the borders of two or three adjoining counties, with farmhouses far apart and their occupants people of different religious denominations, might offer a fairly good excuse for abandoning divine worship in public.

One such district, however, has settled the matter by starting a community church, which has been meeting at the most centrally located school house. The creed of the church is simple: "In essentials, Unity; in non-essentials, Liberty; in diversity, Charity; in all things, Christ first." Not a bad creed for every-day living! The pastor is a woman.

The church has been in successful and harmonious operation for two years, and its membership has grown to such dimensions that the congregation now plans a church edifice. The community idea is to be extended to the general work and play of the church. There are to be playgrounds, gymnasium and tennis courts as part of the equipment.

To help finance the building the women of the church chose a location on one of the main traveled automobile roads, and at a stand well back under the big oak trees, they sold home-made pies, cakes and cookies, sandwiches of home-made bread, and sweet country butter. Many autoists who stopped for luncheon became steady customers, ordering goodies regularly to take to their homes. The men operating the big trucks which ply between the cities are regular and profitable patrons.

The whole thing sounds wholesome, neighborly and sensible. Here is an oasis of unity in a world of dissension. It seems as if the Lord Himself might enjoy prospering a project so free from jealous prejudice and full of simple Christianity.

IN AT THE START

Great Britain has ratified the peace treaty, awaiting only the rubber-stamp signature of King George, which may be affixed at any moment.

The French Chamber of Deputies has ratified it, after long and violent debate, by an overwhelming majority. The French Senate has ratified it and the formal ratification will occur soon.

The king of Italy has ratified it by a royal edict, which to become permanently effective must have the O. K. of the Italian parliament when it meets in December. There is little doubt of such endorsement.

The treaty may therefore be regarded as an accomplished fact. Germany, of course has signed it, and it is to become effective automatically with its acceptance by three of the five big Allied powers.

Friends of the treaty in this country, and in most other countries for that matter, hoped that the United States would be one of the first three powers to ratify, and would thus play a prominent part in the organization and first, constructive work of the League of Nations established by the treaty. It is still possible that the United States will qualify for such participation by having the treaty ratified by the Senate before Italy can complete the formal ratifying process.

Every American who wants the treaty accepted, whether with or without reservations—and this means the big majority of Americans—would be glad to see the Senate dispose of the matter before the Italian parliament does. That would let the United States "in on the ground floor" and enable it to safeguard American interests and ideals by giving the League of Nations an American trend from the beginning.

Having rejected most of the amendments the senate is at last making progress towards ratification.

A REAL PRIZE

Two 12-year-old school girls in Winn Parish, La., had been promised by their respective fathers prizes of their own choosing if they obtained perfect marks in a 500-word spelling test. The girls passed the test. One of them chose a silk dress as her prize, and her father gladly purchased it for her. The classmate asked for a small steam-pressure cooker. And she got it.

This tale is not intended to point a foolish moral about a foolish little girl and a wise little girl. It simply

shows the interest of agricultural club members in their club work and their alertness in seizing every opportunity to do better and better work. The girl who chose the cooker had probably been doing successful club-gardening and had been learning the best canning methods from a home demonstration agent or the club leader. With her own steam-pressure cooker she will make enough money to buy herself a silk dress when she wants one. In the meantime her shiny new cooker will undoubtedly give her just as many thrills of possession and happiness as a new dress—maybe more.

At an age when it all seems much more like a delightful game than like work, she is discovering for herself that constructive work and happiness do indeed go together. She is learning how to use modern machinery and methods in canning and preserving. These lessons she will carry over to other lines of activity as she grows older, and in years to come, whatever her occupation or station in life may be, she will look back to that little steam cooker as one of her most valuable possessions.

One thing that must not be lost sight of in industrial discussion is that the twentieth century method of conducting industries is by collective bargaining. Whatever defects exist in the present procedure of organized labor should be corrected, but its basic principle needs no defense.
