ARCTIC EXPLORERS "DAUGHTER OF THE SUN" ARE RETURNING TO UNITED STATES

NOME, Alaska, Sept. 26—Martin Killin and Adelbert Gumaer, the last two members of Vilhjalmur Stefansson's Canadian Arctic Expedition to leave the Arctic, are reported aboard the trading schooner Anna Olga which is working its way toward Nome along the northern coast of Alaska.
Killin and Gumaer were not members of Stefansson's original party. They were members of a party Storkerson, Stefansson's lieutenant, led onto an ice-floe westward to Siberia. After spending eight months on the ice the men found themselves about 50 miles from their starting point. They all came ashore and Storkerson and one other member headed overland for the outside world. Killin and Gumaer boarded the Olga and started for Nome.
Storkerson's trip outside was his first in eleven years. He has been an explorer, trader and trapper along the northern rim of the continent ever since 1908. He expects to associate himself with Stefansson in handling the Canadian government's proposal to stock the northern tundra plains with reindeer.
