

APPLE GROWING TO BE HUGE INDUSTRY

Apples to be One of Western Oregon's Greatest Assets Says Prof. Lewis

Salem, Ore. Oct. 22.—C. I. Lewis, Organization Manager of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association states that a poor crop of apples in Western Oregon in the territory extending from Roseburg to Portland will mean \$1,000,000 to western Oregon crop, 1000 acre or better. This will mean \$1,000,000 to western Oregon next year, and from \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000 annually in less than five years. This means money coming to Oregon from the outside. It means lots of profitable labor in harvesting, packing and general handling of the crop. It should mean an added prosperity to this section of the state.

To attain the maximum results, better spraying must be done. The scab toll this past year has been very large. For the past two years, we have not had very much scab, but the warm moist weather in June this year gave the scab a good start, and growers were careless in not detecting its presence, or if they did, in fighting it. The result is there are lots of apples which should have brought \$2 a box and better that will have to go into the cull pile. Many of the orchards likewise must resort to better and earlier tillage. Western Oregon is coming to the front as one of the finest apple districts in the Pacific Northwest. The orchards are young and vigorous, the fruit is large, well colored, and of fine quality. "The trade

is learning this, is becoming interested in this district, it is paying the top market price for our fruit.

The Oregon Growers Cooperative Association this past week signed up the largest acreage in its history, namely 1200 acres in a week's time.

Large orchardists are becoming interested in the association. Already in October the association signed up one 350 acre orchard of apples and pears, one of 140 acres and one of 80 acres. The Association now has more than 11,000 acres signed up. One district, namely Salem, has over 2000 acres, and is rapidly nearing the 3000 acre mark. Douglas and Lane counties are following very closely. Dallas and Sheridan districts both have more than 1000 acres. That the association will reach the 20,000 acre minimum predicted by the officers is very evident. Everything points to an acreage nearer 30,000 than 20,000 before spring.

ROADS SHOULD DELIVER GOODS MORE PROMPTLY

Kirk and McKearn local salesmen for the Fordson are expecting two car loads of Fordsons on any freight that blows into the city as they had one car load leave the factory Sept. 25, and another October 5 and neither car having reached its destination at present. In other words it is alleged that material reaching Portland from the east is generally delayed as long in Portland as it takes to ship across the continent.

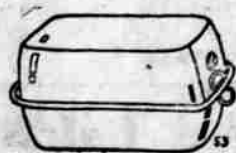

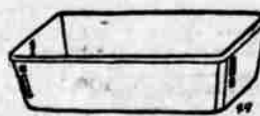
