FRENCH PRESIDENT LOSES 3 HOMES

War Plays Havoc With Poincare's Residences Throughout France

PARIS, (By the Associated Press)—When President Poincare leaves the Elysee Palace the French White House four months hence to make way for a new chief executive of the republic he will, like a great many more ordinary citizens, be obliged to grapple with the difficult lodging problem.

When he was elected president he had four domiciles, his apartment in Paris which he gave up at once, his villa at Sampigny, the old family homestead at Nubecourt and a small house at Bar le Duc. The Sampigny villa was completely wrecked by the German artillery firing from the Camp of the Romans near Saint Mihiel, the homestead at Nubecourt was demolished by the explosion of an army motor truck loaded with gasoline while a bomb from a German airplane fell full into the center of the house at Bar le Duc and left nothing standing but ragged walls.

Consequently the next ex-president will have to go house hunting along with thousands of other citizens, running the same small chance of finding a suitable abiding place.

Much Food Smuggled

DUSSELDORF.—Along the entire Rhineland Holland bored from Aachen to Cleven, the liveliest smuggling of food stuffs from this year's harvest has been taking place recently and the German authorities have been compelled to take extra precautions in efforts to stop the traffic. By the system of smuggling from Germany into Holland, which has been carried on the Rhinish farmers have been receiving at least double the price they otherwise would receive for their products. The Dutch buyers make handsome profits due to the high exchange value of the gulden compared with the mark.

2420 At Stanford

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, CAL. Oct. 24.—Coincident with the decision of the Trustees of Stanford to charge a \$40 tuition fee, beginning January 1, 1920, the registrar's office at the university published figures revealing the abnormal crowding of the university by students, and in particular by students transferring from other universities.

The total registration at Stanford this year is 2420 students as compared with 2035 at the corresponding date in 1915, the year of the heaviest attendance up to this time.

Stefansson's Ship Refitted

Vilhjalmur Stefansson's one time exploring schooner, the Polar Bear, which recently was overhauled at St. Michael, Alaska, has been put in the Siberian coast trading business. She now is the property of Louis Levy & Co., San Francisco.
