CZECHO-SLAVAKI HONORS AMERICA

U. S. Minister Crane Given Regal Palace in Prague as Residence

PRAGUE (By A. P.)—When Richard Crane, the newly appointed United States Minister to Czecho-Slovakia, formerly secretary to Secretary of State Lansing, took up his post in Prague, the government of the new republic assigned to him the magnificent palace of the Cardinal Archbishop of Prague, on the heights of Hradcany overlooking the city, directly across the way from the national capital.

The palace was vacant because the Cardinal Archbishop had been an Austrian prince, and when the revolution of October 28, 1918, the Czech Fourth of July— took place, he was invited to leave along with all the rest of the Austro-Hungarian nobility, and complied.

Mr Crane found around the state dining room pictures of the former Cardinal Archbishop in all the vermilion and purple of their robes. In the audience chamber was a great throne, above which hung a large and splendid portrait of Pope Benedict XVI. In the big reception rooms leading off from it, he discovered a lot of North American Indians displaying themselves all over a set of priceless Gobelin tapestries, with here and there an ear-ringed negro slave.

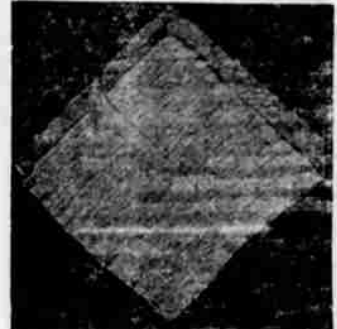

It seems that the Gobelins had originally been ordered and delivered to the then Empress Maria-Theresa of Austria. They were sent to Prague C. O. D., and the price bill staggered even her Imperial majesty. Being somewhat short of funds, she was about to send them back, when the then Cardinal Archbishop, being a noble of ample private means, offered to take them off her hands. The Empress gladly assented and the Gobelins have remained a part of the furnishings of the handsome old house.

WIVES OF POLISH OFFICERS RESCUED

American Red Cross Officers Ransoms Women For a Sack of Flour

WARSAW.—Captain Leo J. McGuire of the American Red Cross returned to Warsaw from Odessa recently with 56 repatriated Polish families, having fulfilled his mission to repatriate wives and children of Polish officers, left behind on the evacuation of the city by General Zeligowski and his Polish troops in April last.

Early in September, the French Military Mission at Warsaw learned that the Bolshevik officials at Odessa were holding for ransom wives of Polish officers. The Bolsheviks offered to give up the women for a ransom of one sack of American flour per woman, but stipulated that they would treat only with an officer of the American Red Cross. On the request of the Polish government, the Red Cross Commissioner to Poland detailed Captain McGuire to make the trip. accompanied only by an interpreter, Captain McGuire attached his two box cars of ransom to a military train

leaving Warsaw for Lemberg. From Lemberg, by dint of bluff, bribery and the prestige of the American uniform he travelled south through the Ukraine and Rumania to Galatz, and thence to Odessa. General Denikine, the anti-Bolshevik commander of the Cossack army had captured the city before Captain McGuire arrived.

The Captain found the Polish women living in conditions much resembling those of a town in Northern

France after an attack preceded by heavy artillery preparation. The Bolsheviks had destroyed whole blocks of houses, first rifling them with amazing thoroughness. Terrorist Commissions had executed 5,000 persons during the two months of occupation. Eventually the American was able to get his charges out of the city and back through Rumania and the Ukraine.

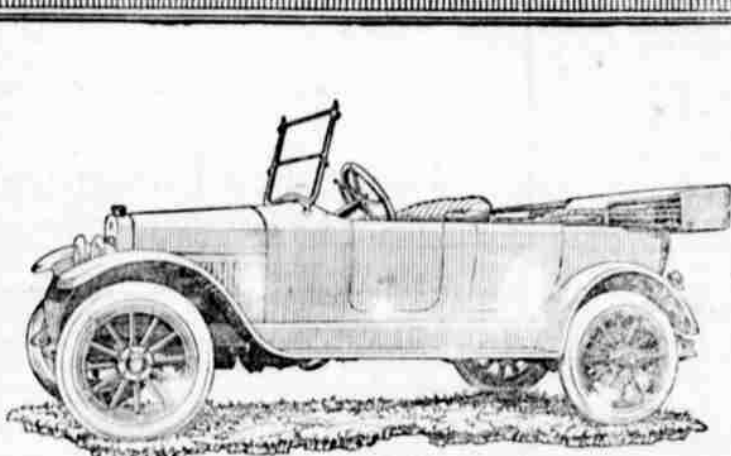
