

RAILWAY WORKERS DISPLAY INTEREST

National Accident Prevention Drive Shows Results

Interest among railroad employees in the National Railroad Accident Prevention Drive is at a high pitch. While the Drive extends to all railroads under Federal control, a special interest is manifested among railroads in the Northwestern Region. Regional Director R. H. Aishton having offered an appropriate banner to the road with over two thousand employees in his region making the road record for the period of the Drive October 18 to 31.

Everything within reason is being done to keep up interest in the Drive, by talks, daily reminders, illustrated posters, and daily telegrams to employees advising them the previous day's record.

Under the rules of the Interstate Commerce Commission, injuries counted will be those occurring to employees on duty which incapacitate them from work for more than three days. Rank will be given on the basis of the greatest reduction in such injuries per hundred men employed. It is the desire of the Railroad Administration that the campaign be extended to include slighter injuries to employees as

well as injuries to partons of the roads and outsiders. The count is taken of injuries to employees only because the authorities have greater control over this class of injuries than over those occurring to outsiders. On the above basis the lines under Federal Manager O'Brien have a clear record for the first four days of the Drive.

Mr. O'Brien has made a personal appeal to each employee under his jurisdiction to avoid injury. Regional Director Aishton has addressed a postal card to each man in train, engine, and shop service.

In order to reduce injuries to outsiders appeals are being made by employees, particularly station agents, agents, and by the newspapers. Mr. Grodzki, General Safety Agent, has forwarded a large number of placards issued by the Oregon Public Service Commission for distribution by agents to automobile owners. These placards show the various devices used by railroads at grade crossings, contain warnings to drivers, and request them to report unsafe crossings.

The clergy, school superintendents and teachers, public officials, and officials of civic organizations are being urged to make mention of the Drive whenever opportunity presents itself.

Records of the Interstate Commerce Commission reveal that there is an average of five persons killed and thirteen injured every day in the United States on account of collisions of automobiles and other vehicles with trains. Figures also show that there are twenty-two passengers seriously injured in

At no time should a driver negotiate a railroad crossing until he is sure that he will make it safely. It would be far better for him to stop, look and listen, even getting out of the machine if necessary, than to be caught on the track with his machine when a train comes thundering along.

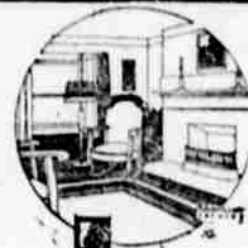
