WARNS AGAINST USE OF SULFUR FOR SMUT

Blue Stone Method of Prevention is Better, Believes Prof. H. P. Brass of Agricultural College

Farmers should think twice before mixing sulfur with seed at the time of planting to prevent smut in grain, believes H. P. Brass, professor of botany and plant pathology at the college. A California sulfur company is urging use of sulfur for this purpose asserting that it has evidence of its effectiveness.

Sulfur as a means of smut control has not been given experimental trials in Oregon or in any part of the northwest in the knowledge of Professor Brass. In most cases the treatment would be a failure in Oregon, although it might prove a success in certain parts of California, he thinks. Growers are warned against coming to the conclusion that because in some instances this method seems to have produced favorable results in California the treatment would be a success in Oregon.

"Nothing is more reliable than the old blue stone method followed by the lime bath for control of wheat smut," says Professor Brass. "Especially as the cool weather approaches this method should take precedence over the formaldehyde method because of definite knowledge that formaldehyde is not quite so effective in cold as in warm weather and also results in a tendency on the part of the seedlings to be somewhat weaker when conditions for prompt germination do not exist.

"Blue stone alone is not recommended as it produces serious germination injury unless followed by lime bath. With this, however, the method is satisfactory. The presence of a slight blue stone deposit on the grain seems to protect against attack of soil fungi which sometimes late in the season are active in causing the seeds to rot in the soil where germination is slow."

TIFLIS, Via Paris Oct. 2.—The Constituent Assembly of the new republic of Georgia sitting as a parliament, has declared the output of manganese to be a government monopoly. MOTHERS MUST NOT DIE, SAYS THE RED CROSS

Sixteen thousand mothers die in childbirth every year in the United States of America, more than are thus sacrificed in any other country of importance in the civilized world. The American Red Cross has announced its belief that these mothers, the very flower of the womanhood of America and heroines every one, shall no longer die through ignorance or neglect, if the public health nursing resources of the country can possibly be extended to give them the necessary care. This is one of the reasons for the Third Red Cross Roll Call which begins Sunday, November 2.

MERCY WOMEN PRODUCE FORTUNE IN GARMENTS

More than 8,000,000 women and girls participated in the sewing and knitting of the American Red Cross during the war. Most of these workers will be active in soliciting members for the Red Cross for 1920, during the ten days ending Armistice Day. When it is remembered that these women and girls in two years' time produced nearly \$100,000,000 worth of surgical articles and garments, including more than 375,000,000 surgical dressings, the fact that they are to assist in the Roll Call is a practical assurance that universal membership will be achieved.

Time to Re-Join

Old Tapestry Restored
LONDON—A tapestry woven in Brussels early in the sixteenth century, one of a set of seven pieces symbolically representing the story of the Seven Deadly Sins and believed to have been bought originally by Cardinal Wolsey and hung in a chamber of the royal palace of Hampton Court, has been restored to the palace after an absence of 270 years. It was recently acquired by a government commission. Found stored away in an old house in Cornwall, the tapestry was bought in 1910 by the Marquis of Anglesey for \$35,000.

Washington Watches Dobie

SEATTLE, WASH. Oct. 28.—University of Washington students are watching reports from the east and are hoping that "Gil" Dobie, former football coach here, will turn a victorious Naval Academy team this year. Under Dobie's guidance, the Navy defeated Johns Hopkins recently 67-0. At the same time the Army lost to Syracuse 7-2. When Dobie was coach here the University of Washington teams never lost a game.

Belgian Industry Crippled

BRUSSELS—The Belgian steel industry is greatly handicapped by lack of transportation. About twenty blast furnaces which have been repaired since the withdrawal of the German forces could start work within the next six weeks if the necessary coke could be obtained. The taking over of 400 American locomotives is being negotiated with a view of relieving the situation.

Belgium is supplying Rumania and Switzerland with coal in exchange for food and is arranging with Argentina for the shipment of 50,000 tons of coal to that country monthly against returns of wheat cargoes.

German Freight Cars Idle

BERLIN—Fifty-five thousand railway cars are lying idle in Germany because of the lack of locomotives, Minister of Railways Oeser told the Diet. Further reduction of train schedules has become necessary because of coal scarcity, Oeser declared.
