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Germans Would Migrate
BERLIN.—The newly instituted National Emigration Bureau is being bombarded these days by Germans who want to get out of Germany—to any old country in many cases, anywhere except Germany. The great majority express a desire to go to America. The bulk of the large crowd that constantly throngs the quarters of the emigration bureau consist chiefly of industrial workers who can find no sufficient employment here in Germany.

The countries at which Germans can emigrate at present include Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay and Patagonia. North America is as yet barred and Mexico, because of the unfavorable political conditions, is counted as undesirable.

Muehsam Held A Martyr

BERLIN.—Erich Muehsam, who led the first Spartacist uprising in Munich last December and who was executed for crimes in connection with that outbreak apparently is regarded here as a martyr. A memorial festival recently was given in his honor in Berlin, by Independents, Spartacists and Communists. Muehsam was once a journalist. At the time of the revolution in Bavaria he led a mob which confiscated the plant of the Bavarian Courier. The memorialists hailed him as a "poet and fighter" and his "Diary from Jail" was reverently read and applauded.

Would Restrict Fishing

SEATTLE, Oct. 30.—Restriction of salmon fishing in southern Alaska streams as a means of stopping the depletion of the northern territory's supply of salmon has been proposed. The Department of Commerce has ordered a hearing on the proposal to be held at the Seattle office of the United States Bureau of Fisheries November 20. All the Alaskan streams between Cape Spencer, not far from Juneau and Cape Sarichef, on the western tip of Unimak Island, will be affected by the proposed order if it is made into a law.

Triangular Debate Revived

SEATTLE, Oct. 29.—Triangular debates between the University of Oregon, Leland Stanford University and the University of Washington, suspended during the war, will be resumed this year, according to Dean Priest, head of the University of Washington department of public speaking. University women of Whitman College, the University of Oregon and the University of Washington, will also meet this year, according to tentative plans.

Rich Deposits Found

NOME ALASKA.—Gold seekers are leaving here in increasing numbers for mysterious rich deposits somewhere across the Bering Sea in Siberia. Recently the trading schooner Esperance was purchased by several Nome residents and is being outfitted for a treasureseeking trip across to the continent opposite Nome.

EDINBURG.—(By The A P)—Lord Guthrie the Scottish judge, has just made public some reminiscences of the late Andrew Carnegie which he disposes of a story which has long been current that Mr. Carnegie received the late King Edward of Skibo with the salutation, "Hail, fat King Eddy". Lord Guthrie tells what the story is based on as follows:

"At Danrobin, not at Skibo, his late Majesty asked Mr. Carnegie to tell him about a great banquet given in Mr. Carnegie's honor at Pittsburgh. Mr. Carnegie mentioned that Joaquin Miller, the American poet, had recited a poem in which he made free with Carnegie's own name and with the names of many much more illustrious persons.

"The Kink asked: 'What did Miller say about me?'"

"Mr. Carnegie replied that he was afraid the poet's reference had not been very respectful.

"What was it?" said his Majesty, and he laughed heartily when Mr. Carnegie had to admit that King Edward had been referred to as 'Fat King Eddy'."

Japans Roads Simplified

TOKIO.—The government has abolished first class cars on all railroads except for long distance journeys. The railroad officials have been shorn of their brilliant gold braided uniforms and swords. All this is a movement in the democratizing of life and the abolishment of special privileges. According to the newspapers, Premier Hara requested a first class car to go to meet Baron Makino who was returning from Paris but the railroad board refused the request.
