TELEPHONE RATE HEARING IS SET FOR NOVEMBER 12

A hearing in the matter of the rates, charges, rules and regulations of the Pacific States Telephone Company, upon the own motion of the Public Service Commission, will be held in the Commission's offices, 252 Court House, in Portland, Wednesday, November 12 at 1:30 P. M. At that time all parties to the proceedings will be heard.

SEALSKINS MAY BE LOWER IN NEXT 10 YEARS

SEATTLE, Oct. 30.—Because influenza last spring nearly wiped out tribes of Eskimo and Indian trappers in the Arctic regions of Alaska and Canada, there will be little trapping, it is said, in the far north for at least ten years, say reports received here.

Furs from foxes raised in captivity on fox farms, will be on the market in numbers, however, as the number of fox farms being established in Alaska and the Yukon territory is increasing yearly.

For buyers will probably find consolation in the announcement that seal skin may be reduced in price during the next ten years. Pribilof Islands off Alaska is increasing and the United States Bureau of fisheries, which has charge of the herd, hopes to see the prices drop as the number of seals increases.

EX-CONVICTS IN HAMBURG FORM AN ASSOCIATION

HAMBURG.—(By the Associated Press) A large number of those persons in Hamburg, who have been punished for crime, especially for technical violations of law, have banded together and formed a society termed the "Central Association of Previously Convicted Persons". It has established its own paper to represent its views, and intends to extend its membership all over Germany. Criminals guilty of serious crime will not be admitted. The following demands have been made on the government.

Immediate issue of an amnesty and the abolition of the death sentence.

Rapid reorganization of the German legal code, with the advice of legally trained ex-convicts and representatives of the proletariat.

Exhaustive reorganization of the punishment of crime.

Abolition of military courts.

A law which obligates the state, the communes and the employers to give employment to convicted persons on equal terms with innocent persons.

All Busy At Butte

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 31.—While nearly a year has passed since the war ended, and while almost all the Montana troops are back, nowhere in the Montana press is serious unemployment chronicled. The mines of Butte have resumed after a strike of metal workers, and unemployment from that source has ceased. While there is no scarcity of labor, there seems to be a job for every man who wants one.

Silver Found on Yukon

DAWSON, Y. T.—Silver, "the white hope of the Yukon," as it has been called, has been found in such quantities in this northern territory that it is believed sooner or later large deposits will be found to replace the decreasing yields of gold and copper. Silver has been found in several places in the Yukon territory, particularly at Mayo, Twelve Mile, Sixty Mile, up the Hootalinqua River and in the southern Yukon Valley. All the reports of silver strikes indicate it is said, that the silver is scattered over an area of thousands of square miles.
