Mr. and Mrs. C. H. McClure and three children arrived in the city this morning from Dagupan Philippine Islands. They are visiting at the home of Mr. McClure's brother, D. C. McClure at 7th and Elm streets where four of the children have been living with their uncle during the absence of the parents in the islands.

Mr. and Mrs. McClure left the Islands for Hong Kong, China Sept 24 on the Empress of Russia arriving in that city had to wait seven days for another ship bound for San Francisco.

They report traffic very much congested in the Islands and in order to get passage from any of the ports it is necessary to apply at least three or four weeks in advance.

Mr. McClure is a successful business man, being at the head of a big commercial institution at Dagupan. The family is to spend the winter in Albany where the children are attending the public schools.



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
