NO SUGAR NEEDED IN THESE GOODIES

Department of Agriculture Offers Novel Receipts for Hallowe'en

WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 31—The young folks need not do without suitable confection for the Hallowe'en party even though the sugar shortage continues to exist. What is more appropriate for this particular season than these candies, all of which can be made with corn sirup or molasses instead of sugar. Let the youngsters have their Hallowe'en treat and serve some of the following sweets.

Pop-Corn Balls

Pop the dried corn in a regular corn popper or in a covered iron frying pan, shaking vigorously and taking care not to let it burn. A cup of dried corn will make three quarts when popped.

To make the pop-corn balls, boil together 1 cup of corn sirup, 1-2 teaspoon salt, and 1 tablespoon of vinegar until a few drops harden in cold water. Flavor with vanilla. Pour the sirup over the popped corn while the sirup is hot. This amount of sirup will cover three quarts of popped corn. As soon as the mass is cool enough to handle, grease the hands well and form into balls.

For Peanut Pop-Corn Balls follow the above direction for making pop-corn balls, but use 2 quarts of pop corn and 2 cups of freshly roasted peanut meats.

Chocolate Pop-Corn Balls are a little bit different and the youngsters are sure to enjoy them.

Cook 1 cup of corn sirup for five minutes. Add 2 squares of chocolate and stir until melted. Cook slowly until a little dropped in water forms a soft ball. Beat until thick. Put 1 1-2 quarts of popped corn in a buttered pan and pour the sirup over it. Form into balls when cool enough to handle.

Peanut Brittle

1 cup white corn sirup, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup freshly roasted peanut meats.

Cook the corn sirup, vinegar, and salt in a saucepan until a little dropped in cold water forms a soft ball. Put the peanuts and the sirup into an iron skillet and stir until the sirup becomes a golden brown. Remove from the fire and stir in vanilla. Have ready a shallow buttered pan, pour candy into it and spread out in a thin sheet. Allow to cool then remove from the pan and crack into pieces.

Molasses Taffy

Cook 1 cup of New Orleans molasses with 1 teaspoon of vinegar until the sirup form a hard ball when dropped in cold water. Add 1 teaspoon of butter before removing from the stove. Pour into a shallow buttered pan, and when cool enough to handle pull until porous and hard. Stretch out and mark into 1-inch pieces while still slightly soft. Break into pieces when cold.

this city. The invitations and tickets which bore American and British flags designed it as the "Victory" ball. The British and American colonies were represented in force. American Ambassador Morgan; the British Minister, Sir Arthur Peel; Count Bosdari the Italian Ambassador; and practically all the foreign diplomats attended as well as many prominent Brazilians representing the social and official life of the city.

The ballroom was profusely decorated with the allied colors.

Prominent among those on the mixed British and American committee which had charge of the affair was Captain Clyark Howell Woodward, of the United States Navy, who is at present attached to the Brazilian Navy Department.

Hooliganism.

LONDON ACTORS DOWN ON CANDY

Tea Served Between Acts Is Bad Enough, But Candy Is Awful

LONDON.—(By A. P.)—Theatregoers in London are demanding that the war restriction prohibiting the sale of candy after 8 o'clock in the evening be withdrawn and have involved themselves in a controversy with some of the actors. The actors do not want candy sold in theatres and they wish the serving of tea and coffee could be eliminated during the performance.

After the first act of a matinee nearly everyone who does not go to the bar, has tea. By the end of the second act the bar is closed by war restriction and nearly everyone who did not have the tea after the first act has it then. The same situation obtains at the evening performance except that the excuse for numerous maids edging their way between rows of spectators with trays, is coffee not tea.

Actors aver that many a quiet situation is ruined by someone dropping a spoon into a tea-cup or dropping the cup itself. Before the candy restriction went into effect the actors were further irritated by the noise caused by crumpling of paper in which the candy is wrapped. They say they could not hope to destroy the aged tea and coffee habit but hope their protests against candy may result in its total banishment.

"But the crumpling of little bits of paper doesn't really hurt a show, does it?" an actor was asked.

"Some night during a quiet situation just take your mind off the piece for a moment and listen to the confusion caused by candy one way or another," he said, adding "that's my answer."
