Notice is Hereby Given to the legal voters of School District No. 5 of Linn County, State of Oregon, that a School Meeting of said District will be held at Senior High School, on the 28th day of November, 1919, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the district during the fiscal year beginning on June 21st, 1920, and ending on June 30, 1921, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district:

SEARS BAKERY INSTALLS A NEW BREAD MOULDER

J. D. Sears, proprietor of Sears Grocery and Bakery, has just installed a new piece of machinery in his bake shop which will speed up his production and eliminate human labor. A new bread moulder, which accurately measures and cuts the loaves into the proper size has been added at a cost of \$800 and completes one of the most modern baking equipments in the valley.

Under the present arrangement Mr. Sears is able to empty the dry flour into a mechanical mixer and the process is carried through the moulder to the pans, baked, and then sent to a mechanical wrapping machine which seals the loaves in waxed paper, ready for delivery to the customer without human hands ever touching the product. The bakery is at present using seven barrels of flour a day and an enlargement of the present shop will be made at an early date. Mr. Sears has rented additional space adjoining his building and will make extensive improvements and enlargements at an early date.
