Woman Army Demobilization

LONDON, Nov. 5—Disbandment of England's famous Woman's Land Army awaits only the harvesting of this fall's potato crop. By November 30 all the "land girls" will have been mustered out of service. Since the armistice, demobilization has been gradual and the army now stands at 8,000 strong. Since March, 1917, 23,000 girls were placed in the land. Several thousand are expected to continue farm work. They will keep to the army style of uniform, a rig and attractive costume which has given satisfaction not only to the girls but to those of the public who have an eye for the artistic.

ELKS TO BOOST

SALE OF W. S. S.

Antlered Herd Gets Behind Movement to Put Oregon's Quota Over

PORTLAND, Nov. 5—For two months the Elks of Oregon are going to urge every loyal citizen to invest in War Savings Stamps and Treasury Certificates. The sale of more than \$6,000,000 of such securities is the huge task which has been assumed by some 16,000 members of the antlered herd of this city.

Because of the lack of time, no house to house canvass will be made. Nor will any particular time be designated for a drive. Through the medium of letters, personal solicitation and publicity, the Elks expect to arouse public interest to sufficient degree that 5000 men and women of the state will invest to the limit in the securities, subscribing to \$1000, maturity value, and thus dispose of \$5,000,000 of the quota. The remaining million is expected to be disposed through smaller subscriptions.

The War Savings and Treasury Certificates bear interest, are subject to redemption upon ten day's notice, pay a certain maturity value and are not subject to the fluctuations of any market, and hence loom as one of the most desirable investments which can be made.

Harry G. Allen, President of the Oregon State Elks Association, has just completed a tour of the state, and reports that in every county an organization has been effected to handle the campaign. "Innoculation of the thrift serum", says President Allen, "will be the work of Oregon Elks during the next two months."

SIMPLICITY IN OFFICIAL DRESS IS FAVORED

LONDON, Nov. 5—The example set by the United States government in discontinuing several varieties of navy uniforms and dress is being cited as worthy of imitation by agitators who favor economy in state dress. Numerous requests made recently by court officials for increased salaries are attributed by these agitators to greatly heightened costs of the ceremonial attire with which they must outfit themselves before accepting office. The cost of a court dress for anyone

attending one of the King's levees can scarcely be less than \$625. A lord lieutenant's ceremonial dress, with its royal red swallow-tail coat, silver buttons and lace embroidery brings a tailor's bill of at least \$650. The robe of the Lord Chancellor is valued at \$1,000—it is a gorgeous affair of ermine and silk. The most expensive of all is the official garb of the Earl Marshal. It contains 1,700 yards of gold embroidery and is worth approximately \$1,150.

REICHSTAG HALL RENOVATED FOR PARLIAMENT

BERLIN, (By A. P.)—The Reichstag building has undergone a rigorous renovation and has been pronounced again fit for Parliamentary occupation. The work occupied nine months. In ridding the great gilded-domed edifice of all traces of the revolution the largest calibre vacuum cleaners, the most powerful of disinfectants and the deadliest of vermin exterminators were employed.

While in addition to the damage it had undergone, the building contained so many unpleasant reminders of the days when civil war was waged in Berlin the National Assembly had a reasonable excuse for prolonging its sojourn in Weimar. But now that disinfectants and vermin-exterminators have completed their work such excuse no longer exists.

The shortage of hotel and lodging house accommodation, however, is likely to prove embarrassing to those of the returning legislators who have neglected to secure quarters in advance.

English Soldiers Barred

DUBLIN, Nov. 6—The Gaelic Athletic Association throughout Ireland is rigidly carrying out its rule that no soldier who has served in the British Army shall be allowed to take part in games held under its auspices. At Enniscorthy, Wexford when the teams lined up for a hurley match it was found that one of the players was a former soldier. The players refused to go on with the game until he was replaced by another player.

N. W. Line Stock Special

SEATTLE, Nov. 5—Fifty reservations have been made for the Pacific Northwest's first special train to the international live stock show at Chicago, according to the state development bureau of the chamber of commerce. The train is scheduled to go east from Spokane Nov 25 or 26.

NATCH NORTHWEST

Loyal Legion Creates Favorable Impression With Lumber Mfgs.

PORTLAND, Nov. 5—Employers and employees of the East and Middle West have both eyes on the Northwest and the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, in the hope that the institution, now local to this section may offer relief from labor unrest and unstable conditions, according to P. L. Abbey, Secretary-Manager of the Loyal Legion, who has recently returned from a trip to Chicago and other points.

Many people in the Northwest were somewhat skeptical as to the future of the 4-L's when it was removed Government control, and the results attained are most gratifying to its supporters who claim that its principal objects, which are to stabilize labor conditions, maintain the eight-hour day and provide an equitable method of collective bargaining have been fully attained.

Mr Abbey states, "When in the East, I explained the workings of the 4-L's to a conference of employers and employees called by the Illinois Manufacturers Association. The interest displayed by those in attendance indicated very clearly their hopes that the Loyal Legion method of bringing employer and employee together would prove so successful that it would be adopted in other parts of the Country"

PORTLAND Nov. 5—In its ninth year of growing success the Pacific International Livestock Exposition will be given at Portland, the week of November 17 to 22 under the roof of a new pavilion covering 7 1-2 acres and representing an investment of nearly half a million dollars. Three thousand pure-bred animals in the cattle, horse, sheep, swine and goat classes have been entered. Eleven states are represented in the exhibits and practical educational program of the Western Dairy Products Show. The annual convention of the Western Dairy-Instructor's Association will also be held in conjunction.
