Y. M. C. A. TO HOLD 40TH CONVENTION

Important Issues to be Discussed at Gathering Nov. 19 to 21

DETROIT, MICH., Nov. 6—Many urgent issues are to be discussed in the fortieth convention of the International Young Men's Christian association which is to be held here November 19 to 21, according to the general officers of the organization. The gathering is expected to bring to Detroit upwards of 5,000 delegates, representing a membership of more than 1,000,000 war welfare workers of the association who served during the war in 42 countries. There will be delegates from Canada, all of the United States and the insular possessions.

Cooperation of the Young Men's Christian association in assimilating back into civil life the 4,800,000 men who served in the American armies will be one of the big subjects for consideration. Stabilization of labor, curbing discontent and unrest, extension of the Y. M. C. A. work, through

the war organization including the use of the "Y" war hut, and plans for world-wide expansion of the American Y. M. C. A., will also be discussed. Official requests for extension of the association to many lands, including France, Italy, Sibera, Greece, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Armenia and elsewhere have been received, it is stated. The use of women in association work, particularly as secretaries, and renewed and wider cooperation with various church bodies are other questions to be placed before the convention by the three large commissions which have made surveys and are prepared to present definite recommendations.

The meeting, a triennial gathering, is declared by association officials to be the most important ever arranged by the Y. M. C. A.

OREGON'S QUOTA FOR W. S. S. SHORT SAYS COOKINGHAM

Oregon is \$6,000,000 short in her 1919 War Savings quota and but two months left to raise this deficiency, is the report of Edward Cookingham, director of the Oregon War Loan Organization in a letter of recent date to the Democrat.

"The task of raising our quota," says Mr. Cookingham, "has been patriotically undertaken by the Oregon Elks Association and it is urged that every patriotic citizen assist in raising the amount. No individual or firm is permitted to purchase more than \$1000 maturity value of these securities but the limit may be purchased for each member of the family. These certificates cost \$842 in October, \$844 in November and \$846 in December. The \$100 certificates are in proper proportion. Actual failure faces us unless every loyal citizen promptly responds to our government's appeal and by liberally."

Germans Offer Sub Parts

GREENOCK, SCOTLAND, Nov. 6—A Greenock firm of shipbuilders has received from a dealer in Berlin an offer of U-boat parts which could be shipped across the English Channel and reassembled into serviceable undersea craft. The man to whom the offer was addressed characterized it as "a rich specimen of German impudence as the present German government agreed to hand over all seaworthy submarines and to break up the remained and specifically bound itself to export to foreign countries no materials resulting from such scrapping operations."

LIVING UNCERTAIN IN VIENNA TODAY

Coal Famine Threatened; Farmers Grow Rich at Expense of City

VIENNA, Nov. 6—By A. P.—Order was maintained in the Austrian capital during the recent general rail way strike and suspension for eight days of street car service. To save electric light and gas, apartment houses, coffee houses and restaurants were required to close early. This increased the food shortage and put the public to great inconveniences as during the eight days the strike lasted the doors of the apartment houses were closed at 8 p.m.

The only profiteers were the porters of apartment houses and the drivers of public carriages. The carriage drivers charged exorbitantly. There are only 300 of these vehicles in the city and virtually no taxicabs. One physician wrote to a newspaper that he was compelled to pay 1,000 crowns to be driven to a dying patient.

One anti-Jewish demonstration was checked by the police before it had reached the riot stage.

As the government now is, with the Workmen and Soldiers Council playing such a strong part, there seems no attempt to regulate public transportation charges and the drivers exact what they can.

At this writing the menace of another coal famine still hangs over the city. The coal supply is most uncertain and affects transportation so directly that the food supply is seriously involved. The peasants still refuse to let grain come to the city and are hoarding potatoes and other standard foods. The Vienna papers charge that in the agricultural districts there is ample food of all kinds. Returning travellers from country districts tell the hungry Viennese of milk and butter and cheese in plenty as well as sugar.

The farmers have made money until they are rich and, as the crown no longer has a purchasing value to speak of, they do not want any more. Here tales are told of pianos, phonographs, rugs and pictures filling peasant farm houses where the city dwellers have exchanged them for food.

The peasants have been warned that if Vienna really begins to starve this winter they may look for civil war, as the city dwellers will organize and arm and invade the agricultural districts.

Eggs have practically disappeared from the city and there is this week a bare two week's supply of grain and potatoes in reserve.
