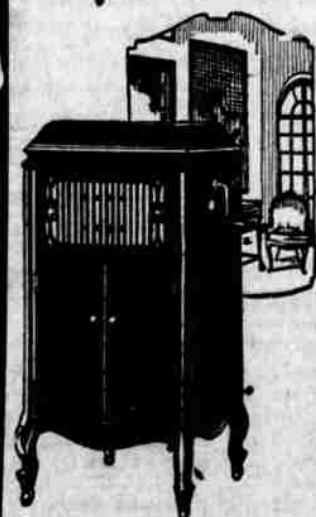

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

HOLD ENTHUSIASTIC RALLY

Practically the entire student bodies of the Senior and Junior high schools, augmented by numerous pupils from the grammar grades of the other schools of the city held a spirited rally last evening as a means of gingering up the fighting spirit of the team and rooters for today's battle with Salem high school.

Led by the high school band, the students serpentine from the high school to First and Lyon streets where they "wound up" and let forth a series of yells that awoke the city to the fact that something would be doing on the morrow. Other prominent street corners were visited in the same manner, after which the long line wended its way to the old Central school grounds where a bonfire had been laid under the direction of Yell King "Pinkie" Jackson, assisted by a band of beaver-like students.

It was a pyre that would have done

justice to any college rally and when the torch was applied the flames leaped wildly to the heavens and the shouts of the students rent the night air. The band played, the rooters, led by cheer leaders Glen Jackson and Dorothy Gilbert sang and gave high school yells and speeches were made.

Among the speakers were Harold Hofflich, president of the student body Prof. Byers, of Junior high school, Dr. W. H. Davis, member of the school board, Rev. G. H. Young, former Colgate University man and ardent football enthusiast, Ed Anderson, former O. A. C. star and member of Albany high school's famous teams of 10 years ago or more, members of the present team and Jackson and Miss Gilbert.

It is safe to state that if "pep" is needed to win today's game that enough of the real article was stored up last evening to defeat any high school team in the state. Two members of the high school faculty, Miss Proper and Miss Devore were other speakers who gave words of encouragement to the team.

At last night's rally C. W. Boettcher, city school superintendent, remarked to a bystander that there has been less rowdiness and roughness in rallies and games than he has ever known. The sport is clean, and there seems to be an encouraging tendency for good sportsmanship among the players and students of the valley high schools.
