WOMAN NAMED TO FEED LONDON DURING STRIKE

LONDON, Nov. 7.—One of the most interesting figures brought into the limelight of publicity during Eng-

land's great railway strike was Miss E. M. Hopwood, now called "the woman who fed London."

Miss Hopwood was secretary to a large commercial firm in the North of England and her business ability was so well recognized that when the Ministry of Food was organized, she was called to the service of the government. She scored such success in her emergency war work that she was appointed at the beginning of the railway strike as food distribution of-

ficer for the whole metropolitan area.

She has an energetic manner that is a source of inspiration to her staff. During the strike she worked steadily from eight in the morning until ten at night taking her meals in the office.

Valuable Art Collection

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—The Grand Duke Oldenburg has succeeded in having the choicest paintings in the Grand Ducal gallery shipped to Holland. He terminated abruptly his negotiations with the government for the State to take over the collection which included five Rembrandts among valuable works by old Italian masters.

BERLIN, (By the Associated Press) Colonel Reinhard, Commander of the Berlin Brigade of the National Defense Army, is quoted in the WORLD STAGE as declaring himself a monarchist. The army officer had denied the authenticity of the interview but Erich Dowbrowski, of the TAGEBLATT, avers that he obtained the interview and that the colonel said:

"I make no bones of the fact I am a monarchist. When one has served the King and Kaiser for thirty years, one suddenly cannot say from tomorrow I am a Republican. That is simply impossible. But do not be afraid. I consider it impossible to resurrect the monarchy for the time being. The Entente forbids it. But what can happen in ten years, how the conditions may have altered, no one can tell. Naturally, a royal or imperial government as we had before the war will not do. But a democratic monarchy is conceivable.

According to the newspaper's account, Colonel Reinhard then asked the correspondent his opinion of the future and agreed with the newspaper man that military dictatorship or something similar must come. The Colonel declared that a strong government must be established and that order should be brought about by force if necessary.

When the interviewer questioned whether a dictatorship would last more than three days, the Colonel did not agree with him but cited his treatment of Upper Silesia where he said, the troops when he went there did not dare to leave the garrison.

"I entered like a thunderstorm," said the Colonel, "and ordered a few leaders shot. It must go that way."

Colonel Reinhard had been accused by a soldier of calling the German government a rabble and the new red-gold-black flag, the Jewish colors. When asked by the interviewer about this he is quoted as replying:

"The Jewish flag is right. It turned the hearts of us old soldiers to see the whit-black-red flag abolished in an instant. Under that flag which they have simply thrown on the dust heap hundreds of thousands of soldiers lie buried in enemy territory."

Independent Socialists Independent

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—The Independent Socialists are gradually refusing to work in the same industries with the Majority Socialists especially where the Independents predominate in numbers, and have struck in some cases because their employers would not discharge their other employees to please the Independents. Even the hospitals are affected. One city's gas plant is threatened with a shutdown because the Independents have insisted that they will strike if the non-Independent workers do not become Independent or leave. The magistrate of Berlin is trying to find a solution.
