JAPAN TO LAUNCH BIG BATTLESHIP

Imperial Navy Builds 40,000
Ton Craft, Said to be
Largest Fighter

TOKIO, Nov. 7.—(By the Associated Press)—The 40,000-ton battleship, Nagato, largest air-ship yet built in Japan and said to be the largest fighting ship in the world, will be launched from the naval dock at Kure on November 9. However, it is understood here that the American navy has projected dreadnaughts that will be even larger than the Nagato.

The Japanese leviathan will be armed with 16-inch guns having a range of 40 miles and her engines are expected to develop a speed of 25 knots. She will carry several airplanes and will be armed with six anti-aircraft guns.

Building of the huge vessel has been delayed by the scarcity of workers and changes in the plan of construction as a result of lessons of the Jutland battle.

When the Nagato is completed, building of the Kaga, her sister ship will be commenced.

K. C. DEMOBILIZED FROM WAR WORK

Well Known Organization
Devoting Energies to
Peace-time Efforts

SAN FRANCISCO Nov. 8.—"Casey" demobilized today except for work in the Siberian and other Trans-Pacific Stations. With the taking over of welfare work at all the army camps throughout the country by the War Department, the work of the scores of Knights of Columbus secretaries who brought recreation and cheer to hundreds of thousands of soldiers, sailors and marines in the nine western states, as in the east, was brought officially to a close.

Throughout the western department for which Albert G. Bagley is director of K. C. war activities, the farwell of "Casey" to doughboy and gob was said, record crowds attending the closing entertainments and participating in the knights' distribution of gifts.

Today, "Casey" is devoting the full powers of his war organization to rehabilitation service. Throughout the country, vocational schools are being opened for discharged service men, where former soldiers and sailors will be given free tuition, text books and equipment in a dozen courses, offered to fit them for civilian life.

Enrollment for these night schools has already been opened by Director Bagley in San Francisco; and early extension of the classes to eight other large cities in the west has been ordered.

War On Snobbery

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Dr Charles F. Knight has begun an avowed war on snobbery in Witham, reputed to be one of the most exclusive places in Essex, through the introduction of dancing classes for young and old. "This winter all Witham will be dancing," Dr Knight declared. "I believe we are defeating class distinction. We have here the daughters of vicars and medical men and they are dancing with shop and factory girls, soldiers and others. Classiness cannot survive that."

TO COOPERATE IN STUDY OF DESTRUCTIVE PESTS

Investigational Work Is Being Carried
on by College and United States
Bureau of Entomology

Oregon Agricultural College Corvallis, Nov. 10—A cooperative arrangement for investigational work, between the bureau of entomology at Washington, D. C., and the department of entomology at the Oregon Agricultural college has been arranged. Investigational work is under way at two points in Oregon. The federal station was organized in 1914 at Forest Grove. L. P. Rockwood is in charge working with forage and cereal insects. M. A. Yothers is working the codling moth control at the Medford station established in 1915.

Since a recent visit in Oregon by Dr. W. E. Walton, chief of the division of cereal and forage insects of the bureau of entomology at Washington, D. C., the station has been working with the college department of which Prof. A. L. Lovett is in charge. The cooperative bureau has been formed through the cooperation of federal and state entomologists.

An investigation is being carried on with wire worms and false wire worms affecting wheat in eastern Washington and Oregon. Due to these insects thousands of acres of wheat are destroyed each year. These investigations are expected to be a great value to the wheat interests, but the solution will take several years. The temporary field station is at Lind, Washington. The federal station has done investigational work with the in-
