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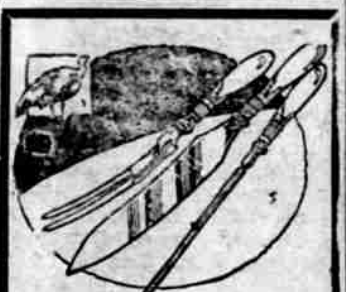
BULLFIGHTING MAY COME BACK

Mexicans Agitate for Revival of Barbaric Outbursts Now Taboo

MEXICO CITY, By A. P.—An energetic effort is being made to restore bull-fighting which has been an eclipse since president Carranza in 1915 prohibited such spectacles in the federal district and officials elsewhere frowned upon the sport. A petition asking that the presidential decree be revoked, signed by more than one thousand citizens of the city of Orizaba, is now in the hands of the Chamber of Deputies and action upon it by the lower house is expected shortly. A similar petition last year failed in its purpose by a single vote. Many persons believe that, with stronger pressure brought to bear this year a favorable decision will be reached. Indicative of a desire to see some far they may go without official interference, is the staging of several exhibitions in Mexico City and its suburbs within the past few weeks, while President Carranza was away on vacation. Advertised as mere exhibitions in which well-known matadors would "play with the bull", they developed into the real thing and once again the "peludos" had cheap meat on Monday, the poor class of natives again by custom being given the carcass of the bull after he is slain. The newspapers were not inclined to censure this technical infraction of law. Instead they devoted columns to descriptions of the fights, comparing them with similar exhibitions before the prohibitive decree.

Rural Carrier Examination

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Linn, Ore., to be held at Harrisburg and Albany on Dec 13 1911 to fill the position of rural carrier at Harrisburg, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. Admission of women will be limited to the widows of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines, and to the wives of U. S. soldiers, sailors, or marines who are physically disqualified for examination by reason of injuries received in the line of Military duty. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.

Museum Receives Valuable Collection

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 15—Thirty-five sets of birds' eggs, together with the nests, were presented to the zoology museum of the University of Oregon recently by Dr. A. G. Prill, a physician of Seio, Oregon, who was one of the first to begin collecting in Oregon, having started in the early eighties. Dr. Prill had formerly collected for the Smithsonian Institute at Washington, D. C., and for the Golden Gate Park museum in San Francisco.

The Prill collection is particularly valuable because the eggs were sent in their native nests. The museum possesses one other collection of eggs known as the Schmidt collection. This contains 75 sets of eggs, but does not have the nests. These collections are of especial value to the students who are studying animal distribution, and advanced students in the zoology department.

U. of O. Girls Club Plans State Tour

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 15—First among the concert trips to be taken by the Girls' Glee club of the University of Oregon this year will be the southern Oregon tour, which will be made during the Christmas holidays, according to announcements made by Helen Manning, manager of the club. Several smaller trips will probably be taken later in the year. The club expects to make its first appearance at Cottage Grove on December 30. A concert will probably be given in Medford on New Year's eve. Other towns to be visited are Ashland, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass and Roseburg. L. A. Coon, director, is now working out a full concert program for the club.
