FIFTY PERCENT INTEREST

This is indeed a large rate of interest to secure for one's money, but the College can tell its friends how it may be done. The new Board of Education at New York has agreed to pay the College one dollar for every two given it for its current expenses for the next three years. The Board wishes the College to secure not less than \$5,000 on this plan, and also wishes to limit its part of the gift to \$5,000. That is to say, if our friends will rise now and give the College \$10,000 a year for three years, the Board will add thereto \$5,000 a year for three years, thus assuring the College a yearly income from this one source of fifteen thousand dollars. REV. GEORGE H. YOUNG, D. D.

It has not been announced publicly before that the College conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity upon its worthy Professor of Bible, Rev. George H. Young. All who know Dr. Young feel that this honor is well-earned, and that the College is honoring itself quite as much as Dr. Young. Dr. Young is the author of several books, a scholar of the first rank, and a teacher of rare ability. This is the first D. D. degree the College ever conferred, in its fifty-three years of life.

The Freshman class numbers more this year than the total student body last year, and also outnumber the sum of the other three classes this year. There are just 105 students enrolled in all courses now. This is encouraging, and points to larger numbers and more life and activity in the future years. The war nearly overcame the College, but it is now reviving fast, and promises to become larger than ever before. Its friends may take courage, and know that the College has passed its lowest tide, and from now on will make fast strides toward reaching their ideals in numbers and life.

OUR NEW GYMNASIUM

The College is glad to announce to its friends that it has secured the exclusive use of the building, formerly known as The City Y. M. C. A., and has converted it into a men's club. It is conducted much the same as a Fraternity house. Nine young men in the College are living in the building and operating it.

Connected with the building is a large well-appointed gymnasium with shower baths. It is the plan of the College to arrange for the girls to have the advantage of the gymnasium and baths twice a week, and plans have been set on foot to organize all the students in physical training. It is expected that this will add very much to the life and vigor of the College.

OIL FEVER RIFE IN LINN

Standard Oil Prospectors Reported Looking Over Ground in Linn

A company has been incorporated at Lacomb, capital raised and preparations made for drilling C. E. Soule is president of the company, N. M. Newport secretary and J. C. Mayer treasurer. H. C. Pyle is manager. A road has been built to the proposed site of the well and drilling machinery is being moved in.

It is cone-shaped with the small end down, and has the appearance of having been forced upward from below in a semi-liquid condition.

ELECTRIC SHIP IS LAUNCHED

Superdreadnaught California Run by "Juice" From Stem to Stern

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 20.—The superdreadnaught California, launched at Mare Island near here today, is a veritable electric ship.

Besides supplying her driving power, electricity is used to hoist the ammunition, rotate the turrets, operate the 14 inch guns, steer the ship, raise and lower the anchor, pump fresh and salt water, operate the machinery in the machine shop, carpenter shop and printing establishment, supply fresh air for ventilation, raise and lower the boats, operate the refrigeration plant, operate the searchlights and radio equipments. In the kitchen electricity peels the potatoes, washes the dishes, makes the ice cream, grinds the meat, mixes the dough, cuts the butter and in many other ways lightens the labors of the sailor lads.

Quarter-Million Foreign-Born

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 21. (Special) If the people of the State of Washington were to pass in grand review, the line of march would contain 256,000 individuals of foreign birth. If natives of foreign or mixed parentage were added to these the number would reach nearly one-half million. Almost every second individual of the whole population has from 50 per cent to 100 per cent foreign blood in his veins. Of the 256,000 foreign born, 70 per cent are not naturalized, and they furnish 60 per cent of all the illiterates in the state.

LONDON, By A. P.—Dame Fashion has set her stamp of approval on woolens for this winter, for no other reason apparently than the very high cost of such materials.

The most woolly of jumpers, jackets, hats, stockings, scarves, gloves and nearly every other article of woman's and men's apparel which may be made of wool, are in great demand at increased prices. Where actual wool is used, it must be heavy looking of the extremely fuzzy variety. Where it is not used other materials must be made to appear as woolly as possible.

Except by those with whom costs are necessarily a consideration, the forthcoming season of woolens is cordially welcomed. It is regarded as a becoming fashion and rather a change from hardness of line and materials which can only be worn well by the very young.
