OLCOTT SENDS MESSAGE TO BOYS GATHERED AT ALBANY PLEDGING HIS FAITH IN YOUTH

The following letter from Gov. Ben. Olcott was read last night at the opening session of the sixth Older Boys' conference here:

"To Oregon Boys of the Y. M. C. A.—

"Oregon has reason to feel exceptionally proud of her boys and young men. While you boys probably were yet too young to have actively participated in the work of the army, navy or marine corps of the United States in the war where she did so much for world freedom, our nation and state will never forget your accomplishments on the firing line at home when you gave everything you had in you for the great cause.

"The eyes of our national leaders are centered on the older boys of today. Tomorrow you will be called upon to grapple with the great problems now being ushered in. Changing social systems, attacks on the conservative order by the radical element, fluctuating conditions in both political and civic affairs, all pre-empting momentous times.

"You will be hurled into those times and upon the shoulders of yourselves and of others like you will fall the burdens of the new times.

"It is our privilege, in fact your duty, to equip yourselves well for the days that are coming. More and more the world is demanding men of high caliber, men not only of brawn and brain, but men of moral force.

"Keep your lives clean—physically, morally and spiritually. No man is so well lequipped to face the world and conquer as he who can look back

into the past over a record without a blemish and without a blot upon any page in the book of his life. The sturdy men and women who are your fathers and mothers have given you boys a wonderful heritage—good minds, sound bodies and an inspiration to be citizens of the highest type. You owe it to them, yourselves and to the world about you to make the most of your opportunities. You will find the world not place for shirkers or time servers. Only those who are ready to do battle manfully for the causes that are right and true can hope to prevail. But when the reward is attained you will find it well worth your labor and preparation, no matter in what honorable calling of life you may direct your footsteps.

"Please do not consider this letter in the light of a sermon. I am not a preacher and there is nothing I admire more than the red blooded, active, sport loving American boy. But I feel deeply that every lad should be impressed with not only the magnificent opportunities that lie ahead of him, but also with the tremendous re-learning the great worth-while fact clean hands and that you already are responsibilities upon which those opportunities rest.

"In passing I wish to congratulate you upon your affiliation with the Young Men's Christian Association. It is indicative that you feel the true value of clean minds, clean bodies and that character building and body building are firmly linked together in the development of the ideal man.

"I sincerely regret I cannot be with you in person today. As Governor of the State I am proud of you boys and for what you stand. I would appreciate welcoming you at any time you pass through the capital city of the state of which we are all so proud. "Trusting that your sessions will be highly successful and accomplish manifold results, I beg to remain.

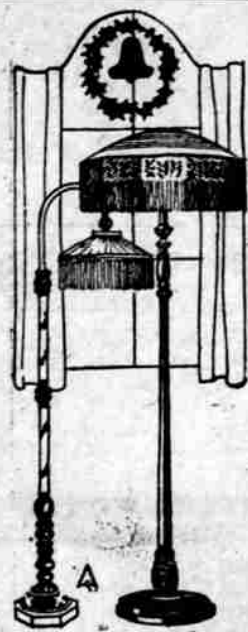
