ALL ARMED IN MONTANA

Sheriff Finds Everybody has Firearms of Some Sort

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 27.—Reports to the sheriff show that practically every family in the county has at least one weapon and many have several. A regiment of infantry could be equipped with arms held by private citizens here, and there would be many arms over. Most of these guns are of the sporting variety, though there are numerous rifles suitable for war purposes.

The records were taken during the war, when the government required the registration of arms, and the sheriff's office is keeping them trim, just in case of possible emergency.

14 ACRES ARE PUT TO LOGANS

F. A. Ericson, Builder of Postoffice, Invests in Berry Business

MILLERSBURG, Dec. 5.—Special—Fourteen acres of loganberries being set out near here on choice berry land promise to materially augment Linn county's annual production of logans.

Fred A. Ericson of Salem is planting this large tract, situated on the old Farlow homestead just north of the schoolhouse. Mr. Ericson is the man who built Albany's fine federal building.

He is draining his tract, fertilizing it with several old neglected straw stacks, and putting in his loganberries in the best methods known. An army of pickers will be required to handle his crop. Since the tract is located close to Millersburg S. P. station and less than a mile also from Cooner O. E. station, Albanyites desiring to aid in the berry fields and enjoy country air also, may come and go from their homes handily during the harvest season.

COMBINATION STORE BEGUN

Grocery, Garage, Dance Hall and Other Industries to be Operated

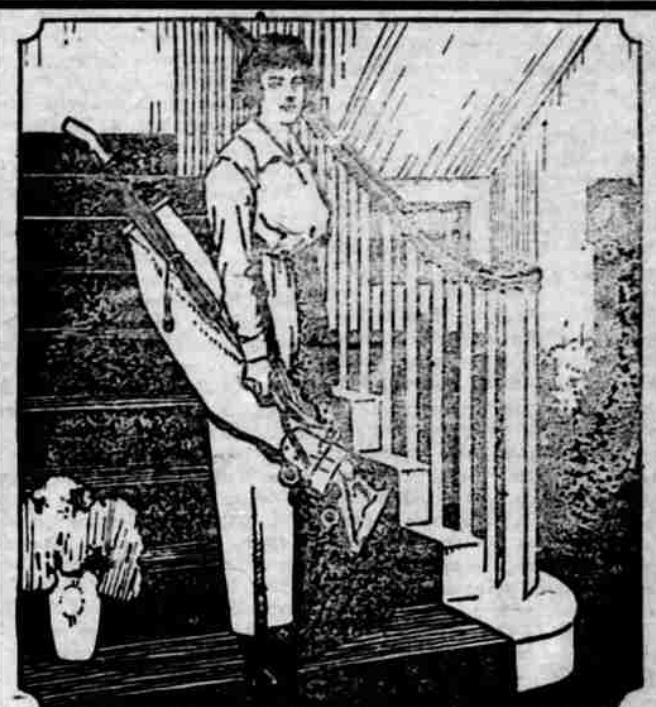
Holly Visitor Here—
