elect A. M. Williams in January.

The Board has asked President Williams to outline the program of development which will be followed in the next few years. Mr. Williams said that his election was a surprise to him and that a program of action had not yet been worked out. He stated, however, that he contemplated no faculty changes at this time and that the high standards of scholarship and the distinct Christian character of the school would be maintained. Other matters pertaining to the inside management of the school are under consideration and will be announced in due time.

"We at Albany remember that Albany College is a child of the Synod of Oregon of the Presbyterian church," said the new president. "The Synod last July commended the college to the Presbyterian constituency over the state, particularly in the matter of

the new financial plan which the trustees began to put under way last summer. This plan originated with the General Board of Education in New York, of which Rev. Edgar P. Hill, D.D., former pastor of the Portland Presbyterian church, is the secretary.

The Board proposes that in the next three years we gain \$30,000 in Oregon for the College and that they will give the college \$15,000 in the three years. About one third of Oregon's quota was subscribed last summer by citizens of Albany. It Albany we expect in January to increase our subscriptions to \$15,000 and then go over the state to get the balance of the needed \$30,000 to meet the offer of the General Board of Education. This money, it is found, with the income from the permanent endowment will enable the college to meet its current needs.

"The college will seek also to comply with Synod's direction respecting closer cooperation with the United Presbyterian church in the general management and control of the institution."
