Dangers of City Streets.

LINN COUNTY LAD MARINE IN CHINA

Harry Wolfe, of Brownsville, Helps Guard American Legation at Peking

Among the U. S. Marines who have been selected to guard the American Legation at Peking, China is Harry McK. Wolfe of Brownsville, this county who is stationed in the Chinese capital. He is serving side by side with British, French, Italian, Russian, and other European troops, guarding the various legations.

Ever since the Boxer Rebellion in 1900, when a small group of U. S. Marines held the Chinese rebels at bay until the arrival of a relief party, a nominal force of sea soldiers has been stationed at Peking, usually remaining for periods of from six months to two years.

Recent advices from the Far East that the Marines have made long four days into the interior of China in search of sport and adventure, and they have found the Chinese very friendly. Deer hunting, and trips to the old temples and the Great Wall of China are among the pastimes of the Legation Guard, and many of the Marines have learned to speak Chinese fluently.

During a recent practice on the rifle range, three miles from Peking, some excellent scores were made, and the Marines are now planning for a good, old-fashioned Christmas feast, as all holidays are celebrated by the men of the Legation Guard in real American style.

Harry, who is a son of John W. Wolfe, of Brownsville, will visit Japan and the Hawaiian Islands before returning to his country, and will doubtless have many interesting experiences to recount to his friends when he gets back home.

Western Cattle Win Prizes at Chicago Show

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—The West won the lion's share of the prizes at the world's greatest live stock show here yesterday and today at the opening of the greatest Live Stock Exposition, California, Washington and Colorado scored especially heavy with Aberdeen-Angus cattle. Colorado and the range beat the East and the Corn Belt when N. L. Harrison's Aberdeen-Angus yearling steers from Roggen, were made grand champion carlot after being finished by John Hubley, Mason City, Ill. This is the third year that Mr. Harrison's Colorado-Bred Aberdeen-Angus steers have won grand champion carlot honors at Chi-

cago, taking feeder grand championships in 1918 and 1917.

The University of California won reserve grand championship of the show on U. of C. Jock Sr., a pure-bred Aberdeen-Angus and a grand son of Congdon & Battles' great bull, Oakville Quier Lad from Yakima,

Wash. Another son of Oakville Quier Lad was first in the aged Aberdeen-Angus bull class, of a Tennessee breeder. A third victory for the Yakima valley herd was hung up when U. of C. Jock 4th was champion pure-bred Aberdeen-Angus calf for the University of California.
