Pipes in Range Explode at Wm. Pfeiffer's Home

Wm. Pfeiffer miraculously escaped being snuffed out of existence this morning when an explosion in his cook stove in his residence at the corner of sixth and Broadalbin occurred. It appears that Mr. Pfeiffer was trying to use all precaution possible by keeping the water from freezing in the pipes but one pipe between the stove and the boiler was frozen up and not detected, and when the fire was started the steam accumulated and an explosion took place which simply demolished the stove, broke out two window panes, tore off one of the door jams, detached the water pipes from the tank and filled the room with smoke, soot, water and steam. Mr. Pfeiffer was in the room and escaped without injury.

Look Out for Fires Is Warning Given

Many winter fires are caused by ill-attempts to thaw frozen water pipes.

A burning match, touch or open flame of any description should never be employed for the purpose. To wrap the pipes with oil-soaked rags and set them afire is worse than folly; it is incendiarism.

Pipes are almost invariably adjacent to walls or partitions where there is an ascending current of air to feed and spread flame. Even if the flame does not start a fire its sudden local heat may cause the pipe to break and flood the premises with water.
