Suit Filed—

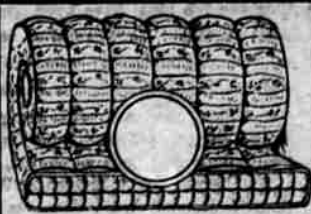
