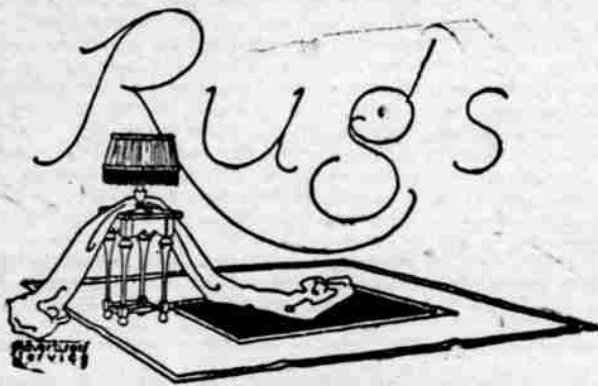

ALBANY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE HAS GOOD DEVELOPMENT YEAR

At the close of the year Albany Chamber of Commerce is entitled to special mention as the leading civic business organization of Albany and Linn County in promoting numerous financial enterprises in Albany and also in being a strong factor in the county in the promotion of a unity of interest.

The Albany Chamber of Commerce was the pioneer in the promotion of the good roads issue of the county and through the good road meetings and banquets held created a sentiment that resulted in having petitions circulated to have the \$600,000 bond issue placed on the ballot and also assisted in sending out speakers over the county to explain the plans to be followed.

The organization has also co-operated with the Lebanon Cascadia good roads organization at Lebanon in securing the co-operation of the High-

way Commission in building the road to Cascadia and eventually extending the road across the mountains. The president Hon. F. J. Miller has made three trips to Portland to confer with the commission on the road questions. Other activities of the Chamber of Commerce has been the assistance in interesting the public in the Albany cannery in rebuilding the Nebergall Packing plant, the raising of funds to promote Albany College the promotion and financial backing given the Older Boys conference and numerous other matters of smaller importance that has been a factor in the upbuilding of the city and county. Three banquets have been held by the members during the year and a substantial gain of members has been made. A rousing annual meeting and banquet will be held in the near future with several prominent outside speakers present.

houses in the city likewise made extensions and improvements.

One of the new buildings to be erected early this year will be a shop and sales room, a one-story structure to be built next to the new Murphy Garage on Second Street for the Willard Service Station. J. H. Bikman has plans drawn for the erection of a modern stone building on his lot on West First Street. It is rumored that plans are under way for another two-story building for First Street, which will house one of the city's prosperous stores. No announcements or plans have been given out however. There are many other plans for new business buildings under way and the coming year will no doubt surpass 1919 from this standpoint.

The housing situation in Albany has been acute, with hardly enough homes to go around. Several new homes were built last year, but there is a demand for at least 25 or 50 new dwellings. Among the best homes built or started last year were the Riley Hulbert bungalow on West Ninth St., the Joe Gilbert home in Sunrise, the H. D. Preston bungalow at Seventh and Broadalbin and the G. T. Hockensmith residence on West Ninth, the fine home for Waldo Anderson at Ninth and Ferry, the Jeff Isom residence in Sunrise and other scattering dwellings throughout the city.

One of the crying needs of the city is an apartment house, and it is rumored that plans are under way for the erection of a building of this type during the coming summer.

AROUND THE WORLD WITH THE RED CROSS



As far back as the first winter of the war, the Red Cross sent to Serbia a sanitary commission that effectively checked the scourge of typhus, but after the United States entered the conflict, the Red Cross was able, in August, 1917, to send a full commission that carried on extensive relief operations among the suffering refugees of the tortured nation. Hospitals were established, the refugees fed, clothed and given medical attention, the army supplied with much needed dental treatment, farm machinery, and tools provided to help the Serbs redeem their land to productivity, and not least, measures undertaken for the succor of the children. The terrible condition into which these helpless victims of the war had fallen is well portrayed by this photograph of a little Serbian girl wearing the rag and expression of hopeless despair that were all she possessed when the Red Cross came.
