amount and informed him that he was going to beat it. The same evening he bought a ticket to Albany. Chief of police Catlin was notified immediately which resulted in his arrest.

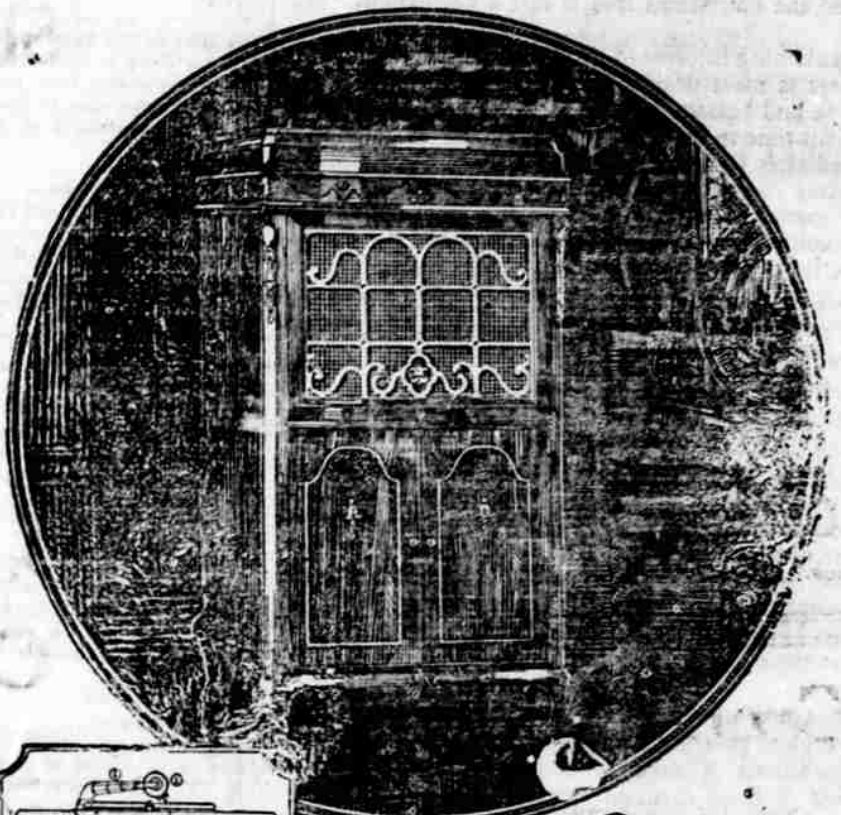
