## JOURNAL JOINS ASSOCIATED PRESS

### Capital City Paper Joins Mutual News Organization; Changes Heading

The Capital Journal, of Salem, is the latest newspaper in Oregon to join the ranks of the Associated Press, the world's greatest news-gathering organization, and on New Year's day comes out with a full leased wire service. The Astoria Budget, which formerly carried only the United Press, is now carrying both services, but it is expected that it will later take on the full Associated Press day service.

The Capital Journal recently tried to get away from the Capital idea and omitted the picture of Oregon's capitol building from its headline. It then inaugurated a combination between a Hebrew and Chinese make-up on its front page and asked its readers what they thought of it. A prize of \$10 was offered for the best answer. They found out, for the people of the capitol city were not slow to express their indignation over the change. The Journal still maintains that Salem's prosperity does not depend upon the capitol's being located there, for, with her canneries, saw mills, paper mill, foundaries, factories and numerous industries, it is able to stand alone and state aid is not needed.
