CLERK WILL NOT ISSUE LICENSES

Russell Decided to Wait Un- til Supreme Court De-

cides on Issue

Pending the outcome of a suit to test the legality of the dog license law, which is being prepared in Multnomah county by District Attorney Evans, County Clerk R. M. Russell today announced that no more licenses would be issued. Hereafter and until the case is settled, County Clerk Russell will receive applications for licenses and place them on file. To date 109 licenses have been issued in the county.

The legality of the law is questioned on the point of whether the law is now operative or whether or not it will have to go before the people and receive their approval before it is in effect. There is a question as to whether part of the law being referred to the people will not cause the whole matter to be thus taken up.

EDITORIALS of the PEOPLE

In a late issue of the Democrat, one of Albany's merchants in advertising his goods for sale says "Fancy Baldwin apples \$1.75 a box, while they last; Local Baldwins \$1.20 a box."

In justice to the apple growers of this locality and in justice to the locality in which Albany is situated. We desire to call attention to some points along this line. If the Democrats circulation was confined only to this locality, no notice need be taken of the ad. But our esteemed paper circulates in many localities.

Would not a stranger to this part of the valley in reading the ad, readily infer that if Albany citizens wish "Fancy Baldwins" the same must be secured from some other section of the northwest? Or that this locality cannot or does not produce "Fancy Baldwins?"

Again would not the stranger be justified in concluding that if this locality does not produce "Fancy Baldwins," it does not produce fancy Spitzbergers, Jonathans, Gravenstines etc. If this be true, then to him this locality is a failure in producing fancy apples. Hood River, Yakima and other sections of the northwest produce many fancy apples and they likewise produce many culls. But they use some judgment in advertising.

Just as good Baldwins, Spitzbergers and various other kinds can and are produced in this locality as are produced in the much advertised sections of the northwest. They specialize in apples. But here in the garden spot of mother earth, we produce anything and everything and specialize in nothing. If the apple growers of this locality would devote the same care and attention to apple growing as is done in Hood River, a cull apple would be almost a curiosity. From the last crop of apples grown on Variety Fruit Farm, fancy apples have been shipped to Lincoln Co., Portland, California, Idaho and to Kansas.

Too often when a local grower takes fancy apples to a local merchant he cannot receive cash for them but he hears that oft repeated expression "Will give you so much in trade." Why not advertise for fancy apples, maybe some local grower can supply you. Especially if you pay him cash as you probably do for imported fruit. Should you fail then it is time to send off for your fancy fruit.

But for the love of Moses, in your advertising, don't give out the impression that fancy apples are not produced in the locality in which Albany is situated.

WILL'S JEWELRY HAS SMALL FIRE

Second Near-escape in Month is Experienced by Local Merchant

Had not Frank G. Will, well known Albany jeweler, been smothered by smoke and awakened at 3 o'clock this morning his jewelry store and fine stock of goods, as well as his building might have been in ruins today. The fact that Mr. Will was awakened and was able to give the alarm, to which the firemen responded promptly, is all that prevented a disastrous fire.

The net result was the burning of a small hole in the floor at the rear of the store and a little damage by smoke and water and chemicals.

The fire evidently started from an overheated pipe which ran from a furnace in a basement adjoining the Will-Stark building and caused the sills under the floor to catch fire. The smoke was coming up into his room over the store in great volumes when Mr. Will was awakened and he lost no time in getting out and giving the alarm.

This is the second time in the last three weeks that Mr. Will has had a narrow escape from loss. During the coldest night of the recent cold spell a burglar was caught coming out of the front door of the store with a quantity of jewelry. The front door glass had been broken with a brick. The man is now in the county jail awaiting trial.

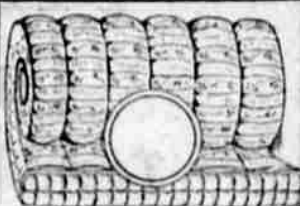
