President Wilson Will Issue Call for Meeting of League of Nations, Says Under-Secy. Polk; Other News.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 - By the Associated Press-Twelve of the leading figures of the Democratic party, including those most prominently mentioned for the presidential nomination, are on the list of speakers made public today from the Jackson Day dinner to be held Thursday night.

The message from President Wilson to be read is the cause of much interest. Its nature has been carefully guarded. Speculation revolves about what he may say on a third term and the peace treaty as a campaign is Oregon City Manager Fig-

Many party leaders expect Bryan, one of the speakers, to put himself definitely into the running for the nomination.

Wilson to Issue Call WASHINGTON, Jan. 6—President Wilson "will no doubt" issue a call for the first meeting of the League of Nations under the peace treaty when the treaty is actually in effect through the exchange of ratifications of the three allied powers and Germany, Under-secretary of State Polk said today.
