WORLD MEET MAY BE HERE

Lutherans From all Sections of Globe May Hold Sessions in America

A special called meeting of the National Lutheran Council held at the Hotel Astor, New York on Thursday December 18th, steps were taken to call a world conference of Lutherans in America 1920. This action was based on the reports of the commissioners of the Lutheran Church of America that have been in Europe for the past six months surveying conditions.

The purpose of the conference is to discuss possibilities of closer affiliation and mutual helpfulness in the great reorganization work that is before the Lutheran Church, if the conference is held, it is believed that it will be one of the most significant gatherings in the history of Protestantism. It will represent a group of more than seventy-five million Protestants, more than half of the whole Protestant membership powers in the world. This group here tofore has been, largely limited to national organization and activity.
