COMMISSION IS NOT WANTED

Southern Oregonians Tired of Fish and Game Body

SALEM.—Following closely upon the request of Governor Olcott that the legislature, in special session here this month, create two commissions to handle the game and fish affairs of the state, and the announcement of the executive that failure to do this would result in the removal of the present members of the fish and game commission, a letter was received here today from southern Oregon to the effect that a bill is in making there providing for the withdrawal of state aid to the commercial fishing interests and the complete abolishment of the commission.

Under the provisions of the proposed bill, as outlined in the letter received at the capitol, the hatcheries and other plants directly connected with the propagation of fish and game would be supported wholly by fees collected from the commercial fishing interests, and would be under the supervision of the secretary of state or some other official. It is said in the letter that this plan not only would make the supervising official directly responsible for the conduct of the hatcheries, but also would eliminate squabbling and bickering such as are alleged to have marked the dealings of the fish and game

commissions of this state during the past ten years.

It is proposed to further provide in the bill that all money from game and fish licenses shall be expended in the counties in which they are collected, and the sheriff shall be responsible for the enforcement of the laws which are now entrusted to the state game warden and his deputies. In order to make the proposed law more effective, all deputy sheriffs, constables, municipal officers and precinct officials would be held equally responsible with the sheriff in bringing violators to justice.

Stocks Sell Wild as Result of Statement

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—A. P.—The stock market was subjected to a heavy selling movement during today's mid-session, leaders recording abrupt declines of from two to five points.

The liquidation was attributed to the statement of governor Harding, of the Federal Reserve Board, who urged the leading bankers of the country to discourage all "unessential loans".

\$40,000 Farm Sells To Eastern Investor

The sale of the Turpening farm just across the river from Eugene, formerly owned by Everett Turpening, has just been made to R. A. McCormick, late of North Dakota, says the Register.

The farm consists of 90 acres and has two lots of buildings. There are five acres in English walnuts, six acres in cherries, five acres in apples and the rest farmed as a dairy ranch. Mr. McCormick also purchased the dairy herd and equipment from Mr. Turpening. The herd consists of 26 cows. A milking machine is used. Mr. McCormick expects to go into the dairy business quite extensively.

This sale and that of 120 acres near Creswell bought by C. B. Bussing from Eastern Oregon, were made by the Sam Rugh Realty company, the price of the two approximating \$40,000.
