HORSES ROAM OREGON RANGES

40,000 Wild Mustangs Said to Exist in Oregon; Pelts Are Valuable

"There are about 40,000 wild horses on the ranges of Oregon and something should be done to get rid of them," said Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, who arrived at the Imperial yesterday from Central Oregon. "As a rule these horses are without owners and are not very valuable, but every horse will eat twice as much as a cow, so it is to the advantage of the state to get rid of the horses. A man in Central Oregon sold his horses for \$5 a head and \$2.50 for the colts not long ago. "The government thought there would be a market for horse meat in Europe and made an appropriation of \$100,000 to carry on the work, but Europeans are apparently not hungry for horseflesh at present, although, sold as meat, horseflesh is worth 12 1/2 cents a pound. It is good, but tastes a trifle sweet. These used to be a market for horse meat in Norway and Sweden, but that market has declined, as the Norwegians and Swedes are pretty prosperous now. The pelts of the wild horses of Oregon would help in the shoe business, and a pelt would be worth several dollars."—Portland Journal.

Compulsory Service is Cut in Japan

TOKIO—Some time ago the period of compulsory military service for infantrymen in the Japanese army was reduced from three to two years. The authorities have now decided to make a similar reduction for all other arms of the service except cavalry says the Asahi Shimbun.

Britain Imports German Goods

LONDON.—Great Britain has imported from Germany since the armistice material to the value of 217,000 pounds and exported to Germany 116,000 pounds worth of goods.

The city of Winnipeg has decided that married women shall no longer be employed in municipal positions, except in exceptional cases.

Queen Philippa, consort of Edward III., initiated the manufacture of England, by establishing a colony of Flemish artisans at Norwich.

In 1873 the high school girls of Portland, Maine, unanimously decided to discard jewelry and expensive articles of dress while attending school.

The Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania is establishing a new course for the training of young women as health doctors and health educators.

The process of waterproofing fabrics in general use in the British naval and military service is the invention of an English woman—Mrs. Ernest Hart.

In California the women are forming leagues, the members of which will wear mourning bands on their sleeves on the date of execution of each murderer in the State, in protest against capital punishment.

The women of Greece in the third century were not allowed to wear silk. The husbands of those who violated this law were heavily fined, on the theory that a husband ought to be able to control his wife's taste for finery.

A report was circulated during the war, and seems now to have been well founded, that among some aviators who reported at Dijon for military service was a woman dressed as a soldier. Her hair was cut short and she was arrayed in uniform. It has been learned since that she was an English girl, and of good family. Unable to carry out her wish to volunteer for service she had joined the aviators, and intended to work with them.

Rifles Used in War For Marine Recruits

All the rifles used by Marines in France have been turned in at the depot to be refinished and repaired. So well did their bearers care for them that most of them can be used again.

When they come out of the gun shop as good as new they will be issued to recruits, who will be inspired by the knowledge that they carry the same rifles that were used in the World War.
