**TALK U. S. ADVISES
METHODIST PREACHER**

**Average Man Does Not Under-
stand Religious
Terminology**

"One of the outstanding needs of our day of for the average Christian to talk 'United States' when speaking of his religion," said Hr. Heist in addressing the fine congregation gathered at the Methodist Church Thursday night. "The religious terminology you use in discussing your relation to God is all Greek to the average man of the street," he continued "the pious phrases of past centuries had meaning in their day, but generally speaking, they have little content even for the Christians in this generation. We must use language which will convey meaning to the man untrained in the religious expressions."

The theme of the evening was, "What Does It Really Mean to Be a Christian?" In discussing his subject the speaker practiced what he preached, by avoiding old theological phraseology, as he emphasized the necessity of a vital personal relationship to Jesus Christ, easily understandable on the basis of a personal friendship, such as characterized the relationship of the first disciples of the Master.

A marked increase in attendance and interest characterized last night's meeting. The atmosphere of expectancy is growing and striking results are confidently expected as the campaign advances.

This evening the pastor will preach Mr. Heist will preach both morning and evening on Sunday. A men's meeting at 3.00 in the afternoon will be held by the pastor.

**GOLD HILL MINES
WILL REOPEN**

**Easterners Take Charge of
Properties Long Idle in
Southern Oregon**

GOLD HILL, Jan. 10.—F. H. Van Horn of Denver, Colo., engineer in charge, representing Victor W. Brown and associates of Pittsburg Pa., has taken a lease and option to buy the Sylvania group of gold quartz mines two miles north of Gold Hill.

This property was recently known as the Ray and Haff mines, consisting of the old Ray, Cheney and Simon holding, and is at present owned by the Gold Hill Mines company, with J. W. Davis of Sacramento, Cal., at the head of the concern. The mine

is equipped with a tenstamp mill, and recent developments have uncovered considerable milling ore. Mr. Davies is now on the ground and reports that the lessees will resume operation as soon as the mine and mill equipment can be put in repair. William A. Douglas of Gold Hill, who recently purchased the Bina Danielson quartz mine three miles south of Gold Hill, is making repairs on the property with a view to putting the mine on a working basis. The reopening of these two properties and other activities reported are apparently the forerunner of a general resumption of gold quartz mining in this region.

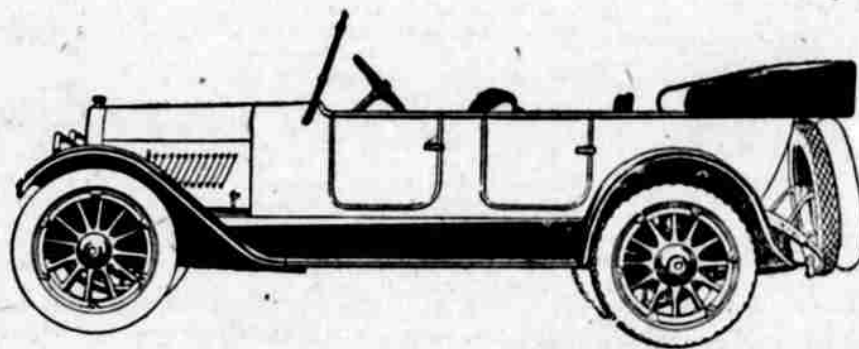
Takes California Trip—
