

SOVIET SYLPH CHARMS COPS

Beautiful Bolshevik Speaks at Police Station; Officers Forget Duties

NEW YORK, Jan. 10—Miss Anna Manson, 24 years of age, known as "Starlight, Sylph of the Soviets," and declared the "most beautiful bolshevik," was sent to Ellis island yesterday to await deportation as an alien agitator. She was arrested in the raid Tuesday night on the Russian

language radical paper *Novy Miz*. So eloquent was a speech made by Miss Manson at a police station, where she expounded the doctrines of free thought, free speech, equal distribution of all wealth and free love, that her captors missed the regular ferry to Ellis island and she was escorted there individually by one of the police department's most courtly detectives.

FLUE BREAKS OUT ON SHIP

Five Dead and Several Dangerously Ill With Disease; Came From Spain

RIO JANEIRO Jan 10—The French steamer *Malte*, from Havre and Vigo with passengers and cargo for Buenos Aires and this port, arrived here yesterday afternoon with five passengers dead, seven dangerously ill, and a large number of others suffering from an attack of influenza which broke out in violent form a few days ago. Dispatches in recent weeks have reported the reappearance of influenza in epidemic form in many parts of Spain, in varying degrees of intensity. A large number of deaths have been caused in Madrid by a double visitation of influenza and typhus.

The three Quebec generals in the late war, Lieut. Gen. Sir Richard Turner, Maj. Gen. Sir David Watson and Maj. Gen. Sir Henry Burstall, are to be tendered a banquet and presented with swords by citizens of the city of Quebec today.

Stockholders of the Standard Oil Company meet at Cleveland today to authorize an increase of the company's capital stock from \$7,000,000 to \$21,000,000.

Gov. Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, one of the candidates for the Republican nomination for President, has accepted an invitation to speak at a dinner of bankers in New York city this evening.

Secretary of War Baker has issued orders for a conference of high ranking officers of the United States Army to meet in Washington today to discuss problems of the army on a peace basis.

Ten governors and the mayors of 200 towns are to gather in Chicago today for a meeting of the Trans-Mississippi Association of Aviation clubs, which aim to open the entire Mississippi valley for aviation.

Numerous temperance and reform bodies of national scope meet in Washington today for their annual conventions and to join in a celebration of the prohibition victory.

Republican national committeemen, State chairmen and other party leaders of the Pacific Coast States meet at San Francisco today for a general conference on organization work and campaign methods.

PEAT BOGS YIELD RICHES

\$1250 Per Acre Made From Cranberries in Astoria Section

ASTORIA.—Next year the peat bogs near here, on both the Oregon and Washington sides of the state line, will produce 33,000 barrels of cranberries, enough to take care of the entire Pacific coast which has been largely served from eastern fields, according to J. S. Dellinger, president of the Oregon Cranberry Growers Association.

The remarkable success of Mr. Dellinger, publisher of the *Astorian*, as a grower of cranberries is typical of the industry on the Pacific coast, now largely concentrated in about 700 acres near this city, although the wild berries thrive from Oregon to Alaska. He started several years ago with an experimental plot of a few acres and now he has 30 acres in cranberries at his picturesque farm, "Dellmoor." Each acre, he estimates, is good for an average production of 100 barrels and this year the growers received \$12.50 a barrel.

Police Barracks In Ireland Are Attacked by Mob

DUBLIN, Jan. 10.—A. P.—Police barracks six miles from the village of Tuam, Galway county, was attacked last night by a party of about 100 men, according to reports reaching here. During the fight two or three bombs were thrown, reports say.

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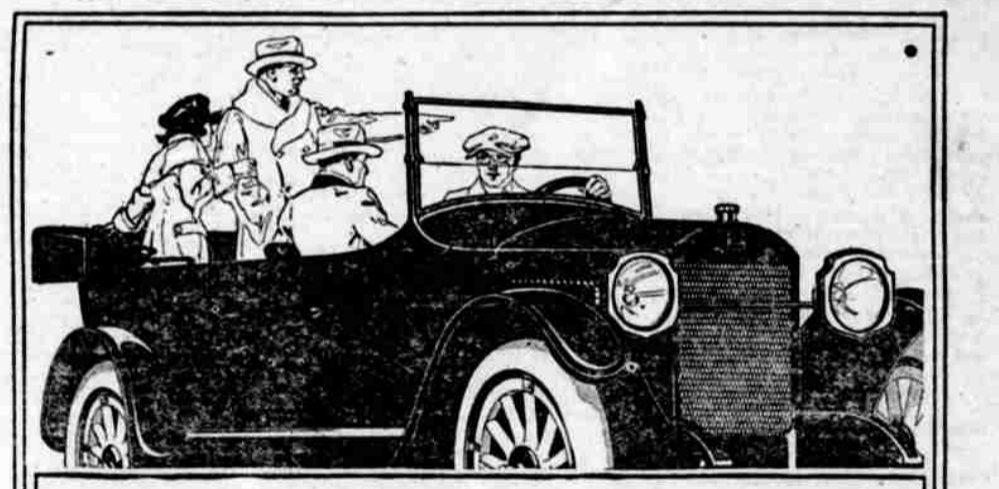
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
