RECORD MADE IN NUMBER AT CHURCH

Methodists Award Boquet to Johnson Family at Sunday Service

"Let's go to church this morning, and be one of the 100 per cent families" said mother to dad, and dad and mother to the boys and girls Sunday, and though no, doubt it required an extra effort on the part of many they seem to have taken kindly to the suggestion, for they certainly went to the Methodist Church and filled it from pulpit to door. The placards had done their work well, and for the time in months, or perhaps years, entire families sat together at the service.

Fully half of the large morning congregation was composed of 100 per cent families, and on taking the record it was found that the family of Paul Johnson was the largest, numbering ten. At the evening services of the church, and the membership appreciated their faithfulness.

The Rev. Mr. A. A. Heist, of Astoria, spoke on "The Christian Life, a Positive Influence," and at the close of the service the pastor received eleven into the church fellowship. The evening crowd was scarcely smaller than that of the morning, and again the entire congregation gave the most earnest attention to the stirring words of the preacher, who spoke on the topic, "But The Sign of a Moral Wawdler". Mr. Heist's positive preaching and the simplicity with which he gives his message to be getting a grip on the people of Albany, and the interest in the meeting is growing steadily. There will be services every evening this week except tonight.

On Thursday evening, there will be a complimentary supper served in the banquet room of the church, to men and boys of high school age only, at Corvallis will speak. After the which the Rev. George H. Parkinson, supper there will be a public service in the auditorium to which every one is urged to come, as Mr. Parkinson will speak there also. Other special features are now in preparation.
