

HARRISBURG MEN TO GROW BERRIES

Local Cannery Contracts with Leading Farmers of Southern Linn Co.

Harrisburg, in addition to being the leading hop center of the county and producing a large supply of potatoes has entered into a new field of industry by moving out into the production of berries for the Albany cannery. W. R. Scott, manager of the Puyallup and Sumner cannery of Albany met a large number of the prospective growers in Harrisburg Saturday and interested a number of citizens who have land that will produce as fine a grade of berries as can be produced any place on the Pacific coast.

W. E. Wadsworth, manager of the Hill and company store has been selected as manager to send the berries by truck to the cannery here. It is

evident that the Harrisburg men are alive to their own interest when they launch out in the berry business to supply the Albany cannery, which is beyond the shadow of a doubt, one of the most substantial business institutions in the county. A contract made with such a financial institution can be depended on, according to best business men of the county which places the growers on a safe basis for a reliable market.

Dana S. Campbell attempts suicide while in jail at St. Helens pending trial for non support of his wife. Campbell was arrested at Brownsville several days ago on a charge of non support and on his recognition went to St. Helens to meet the charge that was preferred against him, and on falling to secure bonds was placed in jail waiting trial. Just following a hearty meal he takes poison which fails to produce the desired effect and he is now reported by the sheriff to be in a critical condition. Prior to being placed in jail he made an attempt to evade the officers and marry a girl to whom he was engaged which is additional evidence held against him as a man disregarding the law. Campbell is an ex-service man about 25 years old.
