Penney Stores to Hold Convention in Salt Lake City

F. E. Livingood, local manager of the J. C. Penney Stores, will leave in a few days for Salt Lake City where his company will hold their annual western conference. The sessions will begin on February 2 and last for three weeks.

The J. C. Penney Company is planning on opening 100 new stores this year, making about 300 in their chain. One will be opened at Portland and one at Lebanon. Leonard Hurst, of the local store, will have charge of the Lebanon branch, in which Mr. Livingood will also be interested. Mr. Livingood was in Portland last week making arrangements for the special car which will carry the Oregon representatives of the company to Salt Lake.

Baptist Church of Albany to Have 2nd Billy Sunday Feb. 1

The Baptist church of Albany are to have a second Billy Sunday here to conduct revival services beginning the first Sunday of next month if the announcement in the Gazette Times of Corvallis of Saturday's issue is correct:

"The baptists are about to begin one of the old-fashioned revival services, and to assist in presenting the message the services of Bruce Evans, a speaker of nation-wide repute among the Baptists, has been secured. In making the announcement of his appearance at the church Sunday, a notice handed in by Pastor Varney says:

"Not everybody likes Billy Sunday, but all want to hear him. Not many people in Corvallis will ever have that chance; but all may hear a man who has often been called a second edition of Billy. Bruce Evans is the man. He is undoubtedly the most popular speaker among college students that there is in the west today. To his own college education he adds wit and humor in an unusual degree, — differing from Billy Sunday in that respect. He differs also in that he seldom resorts to slang in any disagreeable way and is never

abusive. He can tell more funny stories in a given length of time than probably any other man living, and each one will have a point. He is not only entertaining, but inspiring. "Bruce, as you will call him after knowing him twenty-four hours, will speak at the Baptist church next Sunday at both services. Both addresses are free to the public, although either one is worth fifty cents to anybody."

Rev. Evans is well known in Albany having conducted revival meetings here several years ago.

OREGON STUDENTS RAISE \$6,000 ON BUILDING FUND

Largest Single Subscription \$1,000; Prineville Goes Far Above Quota

U. of O., EUGENE—Approximately \$6,000 has already been reported as raised in the students' campaign to raise \$30,000 for the completion of the women's building on the campus. Wilbur Carl, of Portland, chairman of the student's committee, expresses the belief that the full reports will show approximately \$10,000 subscribed. The largest contribution made during the vacation drive was \$1,000 by a donor who requested that his name be kept secret for the present.

The amount raised in the various communities bore no direct relation to their size. Prineville with a basket social ran its total contribution up to \$300, through the friendly activity of an enterprising cattle-rancher who as auctioneer conducted the bidding with results. He went out, in the first place, so the story goes, and brought in the greater part of the bidders and then saw to it that baskets brought "all the traffic would bear."
