W. C. T. U. IN LINN COUNTY ACTIVE

Reports of Officers at Executive Meeting Shows Encouraging Results

The annual executive meeting of the Linn County W. C. T. U. met in Albany at the Library building, January 10 at one o'clock.

The following members of the official board were present: Mrs. Emma L. Archibald, County president; Miss Grace I. Driver, Vice-President; Mrs. Clark, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Cecil O. Wilhelm, Treasurer.

Every active union in the county was represented as follows: Albany, Mrs. Lillian French, Mrs. Henrietta Brown, Mrs. L. E. Blain, Mrs. W. E. Anderson; Harrisburg, Mrs. Elizabeth Robinson, Mrs. Cecil O. Wilhelm, Mrs. Clark; Plainview, Mrs. Adelle Wheel- don, Mrs. Tibbetts; Oakville, Mrs. Emma L. Archibald, Mrs. G. W. Anderson; Shedd, Mrs. Mary B. Powers; Brownsville, Mrs. F. S. Walker, Mrs. Holloway; Tanlent, Miss Grace I. Driver.

Work for the year 1920 was outlined and the outlook was most favorable, there being no difficulty of any moment to cause discouragement.

Miss Driver reported that of the County quota of \$500 for the Jubilee Fund, \$332.50 had been sent to the state treasurer and the remaining \$167.50 is practically provided for in that each union has accepted its quota; and there is no apprehension but that the county will have paid in full by the appointed time, March 20, 1920.

Harrisburg is the banner union in the membership drive, reporting 12 new members gained in the Jubilee drive, beginning March 1919.

One new union has been organized in the county, at Tanlent.

Mrs. Wilhelm reported a surplus in the treasury. One encouraging feature of the Jubilee fund drive is that one-fourth of ninety per cent of the sum raised is returned to carry on the county work.

Each union will hold a one-day institute during the year and will invite one or more neighboring unions to participate with them. Mrs. Henrietta Brown of Albany is superintendent of institutes.

Local Theatres Undergo Many Changes of Laic

Managers C. F. Hill and Ed. I. Hudson are making a few improvements in the Globe and Rolfe theatres these days. 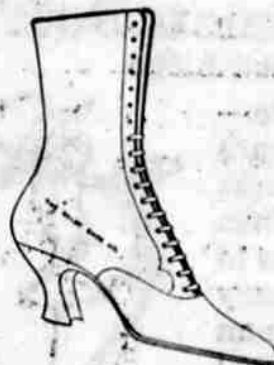

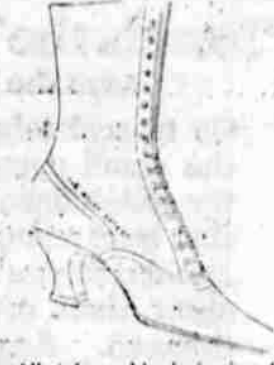
