PLEDGES FOR ALBANY COLLEGE

(Continued from January 1)

Education assists a certain number of colleges in a large way each year. This year they are raising \$7,000,000 for seventeen of these colleges—most of them needier than Albany in a financial way. The Board has asked us if we want to be counted in the list for the year 1920-21. We will have to meet certain conditions if we get in this pool. The first step in meeting those conditions is the successful issue of the present convass in Albany. I may be able to make some announcement authorized by the trustees on this matter before the end of this college year.

Enrollment Shows Increase

"How many students have we at Albany College and what is the prospect for building up a student body? Exactly 107 students have enrolled the first semester, says Dr. Lee who has checked the lists carefully in all departments. In the regular college classes looking to degrees are about 45. I say 'about', because some of

these are taking 'special' courses, which however will give them credit toward degrees. This is an increase of nearly 100 per cent over last year. Already we are getting inquiries for year, and I shall be greatly disappointed if we do not add 50 percent to the student body next year."

protested against the use of the vacant land adjoining his meat packing plant for a city dump ground. He stated that his attention had been called to the place by the government inspectors and he was ordered to see that the dumping of refuse there was stopped or his government inspection would be taken away from him. Mr. Nebergall stated that they had succeeded in ridding his place of rats, but that they had migrated to the dump piles where they feed on decaying vegetables, meats, etc., dumped there by the city and are multiplying by the thousands. The rats were pointed out as a menace.

M. Senders, in behalf of the Jewish

Cemetery Association also protested against the dump grounds, stating that wagons passed through the cemetery to gain access to the grounds and were a general nuisance to the association. The matter was referred to the committee on Streets and Public Property to make arrangements for the removal of the debris and the acquiring of a new place for the purpose.

The Park Commission, composed of Mrs. R. E. Mason, chairman; Mrs. Annette Weatherford, secretary; Mrs. J. J. Lindgren, treasurer and Mrs. Nellie Myers and Mrs. Viola Price Franklin submitted its annual report. The report showed receipts for the year to be \$1,077.99, derived as follows:

Receipts from carnival Co., \$375.43; rent to Apostolic Faith, \$20; Fire Department gifts, \$100; drive, \$375.43; July 4th, Committee, \$71.96; Women's Cliv Imp. Club, \$297.15; City park fund \$100.

The committee reported that their work was necessarily slow, but that they are building on a permanent scale and what is done will be done right.

Fire Chief Clark Price made his annual report covering the period he has served, from Sept. 1 to Jan. 1. During this time the department has answered 29 calls, 11 of which were in December. The insurance carried on the places burned was \$100,000. The loss inflicted \$240 and the insurance collected \$285. The record is a good one.

Chief Price recommended the purchase of from 700 to 1,000 feet of fire hose and one cellar nozzle and three gas masks. Representatives of the A. G. Long & Co., of Portland, and the U. S. Rubber Co., were present and submitted bids of \$1.35 and \$1.25 per foot respectively. The matter was referred to the committee on Fire and Water with power to act.

Dr. Jos. Myers, city health officer, called the attention of the council to the unsightly and unsanitary condition of the lots back of the buildings at First and Lyon Streets. He was empowered to notify the owners to clean up without further delay.

Councilmen Fred Fortmiller and Clyde Williamson, elected to fill the vacancies of E. L. Wieder, who removed from his ward and R. A. B. Vail whose death occurred recently, were installed into office and sat in for the first time.

There were no contests for elections except for night police. Dick Roud

ers, who has given efficient service for many years, was re-elected unanimously, and Glen Cox was given the other night job. Applications were received from Charles Dow and G. M. DeVaney. Cox was elected because of his ability to ride a motorcycle and handle the traffic problem of the city. Other officers named were as follows:

Health officer, Dr. Jos. Myers; Fire Chief, Clark Price; Street Commissioner, Glen Junkin; City Attorney, Dan Johnston; dog catcher, left to Chief Catlin. No election took place for city engineer.

Upon the suggestion of city recorder L. G. Lewelling Dan Johnston was employed to audit the books of the city recorder and the city treasurer for the past year.

The matter of securing a full count of the city in the present census was taken up. At the suggestion of the City Recorder the papers were empowered to run advertisements calling attention to the census. The city recorder's office was named as the clearing house and all persons who have not been counted should notify this office and their cases will be taken care of.

R. U. Steelquist, local manager of the Mountain States Power Co., made a statement regarding the order of the council for a water main and hydrant at Salem Road and Pine Streets. He stated that the cost to serve 15 families was greater than the revenue would justify, but said that his company is willing to do anything possible to relieve the matter. Fire Chief Price stated that a hydrant at this point is imperative and a committee was authorized to go over the grounds with the Power Company and make whatever arrangements are best.

Big Fruit Growers Meeting to be Held Here in Near Future

W. R. Scott of the Albany cannery states today that he is making arrangements for a big fruit growers meeting and banquet here as soon as he can secure a date that Mr. Paulhamus can be present. He is now in the east and may return at any date.
