NEW AUTOMOBILE FIRM ANNOUNCED

Methodists Enjoy Fine Meeting; Dr. Parkensen Is Speaker

The business men's Bible Class of the Methodist church and invited friends enjoyed a complimentary banquet and a fine program in the dining room parlors of the church last night, beginning at six o'clock, given by the ladies of the church assisted by Mrs. Humphreys who is in the city representing the use of Oregon manufactured products. Rev. J. C. Spencer, pastor of the church acted as chairman of the occasion, and set forth the purpose of the meeting and made all feel at home.

Mrs. Humphreys was first introduced and made a strong talk on behalf of home manufacturers and urged the house wives to buy articles of food as are produced in Oregon. She stated that the housewife did 83 per cent of the buying for the home but made no statement regarding who did the paying. In addition to what the ladies of the church furnished, Mrs. Humphreys served hot biscuits, made out of Crown hard wheat flour, manufactured by an Oregon company, jellies and jams by Wadhams and Kerr of Portland, Catsups, by Knight Packing company, of Medford, Shortenings in cooking by Swift and company of Portland, and oleomargarine as a substitute for butter made by a Portland firm.

Mrs. Humphreys made many valuable suggestions in the interest of the Oregon manufacturer and consumer and in all cases makes the appeal that the manufactured article of the home town should have first consideration.

The next number of the list was a selection by the Methodist Male Quartette which was well received.

Dr. G. H. Parkensen, pastor of the Methodist church of Corvallis made the talk of the evening which, without doubt inspired every man present.

He extracted as a text from the 16 verse of the 72nd chapter of the psalms these words: "Unlikely Places", and around this thought the speaker gave numerous examples of distinguished men and women from "unlikely places" who have been factors in the world's greatest development in all lines of human progress. The speaker cited to the humble beginning of Mrs. Burton, the great foreign missionary; the story of the birth of Lincoln in a log hut over which stands a marble palace today; the life of Edison, the wizard of electricity, who was a man from an "Unlikely Place".

"The speaker also drove home the fact that out of the 'Unlikely Places' in the mental moral and physical qualities of men come the greatest development. In the army the psychologist classed men for what they were best fitted. The hearer was led to consider what he is best fitted to do in the world and also to make opportunity where there is none in sight. The last appeal of the speaker was that all should be willing to make sacrifice for heroism. Out of the homes of the people must come the great men of earth, he said.

The opening of a new automobile agency in Albany was formally announced yesterday when E. L. Getz and A. R. Grout, of Portland came to this city to establish permanent residences and make this their future homes. Messrs Getz and Grout have purchased the Pacific Garage at Second and Ellsworth Streets and will call their business the Willamette Motor Car Company.

Messrs Jones and Gell, of the Pacific Garage, have leased the building now occupied by the Murphy Motor Co., and will move into these quarters as soon as the new Murphy building is finished. The Willamette Garage will be entirely remodelled. A new front with plate glass will be put in and the front of the building will be partitioned off into a sales room where the Franklin and Scrips-Booth cars will be on display. The driveway will be installed on the west side of the building, and windows will be cut into the west wall.

Messrs Getz and Grout have the agency for Linn, Lincoln and Benton counties for the Franklin and General Motors Corporation, and will handle in addition a truck line to be announced later. They have employed one of the best repair men in the state, an expert on Franklin cars, and will take care of the service work for the Franklin for the entire upper end of the Willamette Valley.

The new firm is not entirely unknown to Albany people. Both members are graduates of the University of Oregon, being members of the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity and were popular in college circles during their course at Eugene. Mr. Getz has been serving as superintendent for the Bruly Auto Co., of Portland, for the last two years. For five years previous to that time he was superintendent of the Portland and Seattle assembly plants of the Ford Motor Co. and has been in the automobile business since 1910.

Mr. Grout is an expert in the truck end of the business, having served for two years as superintendent of all gas engine and automotive power and truck equipment at the Willamette Steel and Iron Works in Portland. For the last two years he has been sales manager of the Thoms Engine Works, manufacturers and distributors of gas engines and truck equipment.
