ALBANY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO ASSIST IN CENSUS COUNT FOR CITY

Spirited Meeting Puts New Life in Organization and Work of Importance to the City is Outlined.

BANQUET NEXT MONTH

Industrial Survey of County is Ordered; Bank Resources to be Compiled; C. E. Convention to be Helped.

The Albany Chamber of Commerce demonstrated that it is alive to the importance of securing a complete count of the population of the city at the first meeting of that body held during the new year, and steps were taken to check up and assist in getting every possible person enumerated.

The census of the city attracted the earnest attention of the members, as many have not been enumerated and as but three days remain to finish the enumeration on which Albany will be classed for the next ten years.

E. M. Reagen was authorized to take the lead in securing enough boys to make the census of the entire city today and report the names of all persons not enumerated to the officials who will complete the enumeration. The Linn county fair was discussed and the importance of every member getting behind the leaders of the fair and doing his part was emphasized.

The financial report of the boys' conference was presented by Dr. Geo. H. Young showing a deficit of \$33.27 which was ordered paid out of the funds of the chamber. Dr. Young also presented a request from the young people's committee of the city asking financial assistance and moral support in managing the Christian Endeavor State convention which is to be held here February 20 to 22, at which time about 800 delegates and many prominent speakers will be in attendance. The expense of the convention is estimated at about \$800. Dr. Young was assured that the chamber of commerce would do its part and appointed R. U. Steelquist to confer with the committee of the convention.

W. R. Scott presented a plan to have an Albany calendar printed here for next year instead of the business men buying separate calendars at a great cost. The plan presented which is being successfully carried on at other places is much cheaper for the merchant and gives a list of the business firms of the city and much other statistical information not found in the individual calendar. W. R. Scott, L. E. Hamilton and W. A. Eastburn were appointed a committee to confer with the business men of the city regarding the plan for next year.

Owing to many inquiries from the state chamber of commerce and other agencies regarding the resources of Albany and the county at large it was decided to make an industrial survey of the county to be used in advertising the resources and industries. J. M. Hawkins, E. M. Reagen, W. L. Jackson and county agent S. V. Smith were appointed a committee to make the survey.

President F. J. Miller was authorized to appoint a committee to prepare a report on the bank clearings of the county and as a result selected E. D. Cusick, of the J. W. Cusick & Co., bank, J. C. Irvine of the First National Bank and Elmer B. Williamson of the Albany State Bank to handle the work.

The salary of the secretary of the chamber was increased to \$60 per month.

C. C. Cameron, L. E. Hamilton, B. C. Miller, W. J. Wood, W. L. Jackson, W. R. Scott, F. H. Pfeiffer and R. U. Steelquist appointed a committee to prepare a banquet and program for the business men of Albany and vicinity, February 6th, at which time a rousing time will be held.

The Linn County fair was discussed and the Chamber will take an active part in promoting this valuable asset to the county.

CENSUS COUNT IS EXTENDED

Two More Days Given to Complete Enumeration; Information Asked

Two more days have been granted for the completion of the census enumeration in Albany. Word was received today to this effect and the count, which was to have come to a close tonight, will proceed until Tuesday night, which will enable a number of people who have been overlooked to be included in the city's population.

It is a civic duty for every person in the city to give the government this information, which cannot be used in any way in making out tax statements or for any other purpose than purely statistical uses of the government.

Rev. Mr. Williams was a Baptist minister and for many years took a leading part in religious work in Linn County.

Funeral services will be held Sunday at 11:30 a. m. at the Odd Fellows hall in this city and the body will be taken to Salem for burial in Mt. Hope cemetery.

NOTED ARMENIAN TO SPEAK HERE

General Mesrop Azepetian, Scholar and Statesman, to be Heard Monday

Dr. W. P. White chairman of Armenian Relief Committee for Linn County, today received word that General Mesrop N. Azepetian, a native Armenian, will speak in this city at 8 o'clock Monday evening at the Baptist church.

The distinguished visitor is a graduate of three universities, including Columbia University, New York. He was Aide de Camp of the Shah of Persia and later secretary of the Persian legation at Washington. He later commanded a division of the Russian army, holding his division intact after the Bolsheviks had disintegrated the rest of the Russian army, until the arrival of English troops.

He was repeatedly decorated for valor. He is a magazine writer of note and speaks eight languages fluently. He always makes a profound impression with his statesman-like appeal. He spoke before the Kiwanis club at New Orleans last week and they wired to New York asking the head of the organization to arrange for him to speak before all Kiwanis clubs in the United States.

It is expected that a large crowd will be present to hear him.

Admiral Jellico Called to England

RIO JANERIO, Jan. 16.—Admiral Viscount Jellicoe has received an urgent call to England and for that reason has cancelled his visit to Brazil and Argentine.

Three Killed In Big Explosion In Cincinnati

CINCINNATI, Jan. 17.—A. P.—Three firemen were killed and a score of persons injured when an explosion blew out the east wall of a store building in the river front district here early today. The loss is approximately \$100,000.

Relations To Resumed By Allies and Russia

LONDON, Jan. 17.—A. P.—Commercial relations will be reopened between the Allied nations and the Russian people immediately as a result of a decision reached by the Supreme Council at Paris yesterday. This step does not imply an altered attitude toward the Trotsky-Lenine government, according to a statement issued by the council.

State Highway Commissioner Talks on Value of Good Roads to State; 125 Are Present.

Fully 125 prominent men from all parts of Linn County met at the dinner given by the Good Roads Association at the St. Francis hotel this noon and listened with interest to the discussions on good roads. The organization is at work on plans to develop the roads of the county and is creating good-roads sentiment in every precinct.

Rex Davis of Harrisburg, president of the association, following the banquet called the house to order and stated that the association was a voluntary organization of the county for the purpose of supplementing the efforts of those who were in the lead to make better roads, and made the request to those who were to speak that they talk ways and means of conducting the work and not from the standpoint of a knocker as one man had as much right to his opinion as another.

PARIS, Jan. 17.—A. P.—The Supreme Council's letter to the Dutch Government demanding the extradition of former emperor William has been sent to that government. It was forwarded officially during the night.

Austrian War Ship Damaged by Their Crews

GENEVA, Jan. 17.—By A. P.—The Austrian war vessels to be handed over to the allies have undergone a second "scapa flow" on a smaller scale, according to a telegram from Turin. The vessels have been seriously damaged, only the hulls remaining in good condition, it is said.

District Deputy Exalted Ruler Of Elks Here

Albany Lodge No. 359, B. P. O. S., is to be honored by an official visit to-night from W. S. Wiley, Deputy district Grand Exalted ruler for the southern division of the state which includes all the lodges from Oregon City south. A class of 10 is to be initiated and a fine banquet served for which the Albany Elks are especially noted.

NAVY DEPT. BLAMED BY SIMS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—By A. P.—Rear Admiral Sims told the Senate committee, investigating naval awards today that when he was ordered to England in March 1917, just before the United States entered the war, he was instructed by the Navy Department "not to let the British pull the wool over your eyes," and that "we would just as soon fight the British as the central powers."

Admiral Sims also charged that the American naval headquarters in London, did not receive the cooperation of the Navy Department and that the department did not arrive at any decided plan of action until ten months after he arrived in London. He added that "it was ten months before we really came to the aid of the allies or acted on their recommendations."

Chairman Hale announced that the full naval committee be asked to hear Sims' charges.

COMMISSION IS NAMED IN SUIT

Game Board Charged With Buying Game Farm to Pay Political Debt

SALEM, Jan. 17.—By A. P.—Allegations to the effect that the fish and game commission acquired the Reddish game farm in Lane county to pay an alleged political debt, incurred during the last legislature were contained in a suit instituted in the circuit court here today against the commission by H. A. Holmes.

Governor Olcott was also made defendant in the action, which is to restrain the commission from paying the obligations on the ground that they are invalid.

COURT ORDERS LINES CHANGED

Voting Precincts Inside City Limits Made to Conform to City Lines

Through an order of the Linn County court issued today the boundaries of all of the voting precincts bordering on the city of Albany have been changed to conform with the boundaries of the city. In the past, several of the precincts included territory both within and without the city limits. Hereafter, the wards within the city will include precincts wholly within the city limits.

Following are the boundaries of the precincts:

Precinct No. 1, all territory in the city limits west of Maple Street; No. 2, Maple Street to Washington.

No. 3, Washington St. to Broadalbin.

No. 4, Broadalbin St. to Lyon.

No. 5, Lyon St. to Railroad St.

No. 6, Railroad St. to Thurston.

No. 7, Thurston St. to Main.

No. 8, Main St. east to city limits.

Precinct No. 9 outside of the city limits has been created out of all the territory formerly in precincts 8 and 9 which laid outside of the city and the line has been extended one mile east, taking in sections 9 and 4 from Precinct and section 33 out of Knox Butte precinct.

All territory outside of the city limits and west of the Tanager road is in the Calapooia precinct and all territory east of the Tanager road to the Hackleman road is in Sunrise precinct.

Red Transport Reaches Finland

HANGO, Finland, Jan. 16.—A. P.—The U. S. Army transport Buford, having aboard 249 radicals deported from the United States, arrived here this afternoon. The reds aboard the vessel are to be taken to the Russian frontier by U. S. Labor Bureau and immigration officials.
