**King of Speed Demons is Impressed with Albany; Tells Experiences**

Barney Oldfield was delighted with Albany on his visit here last evening when he was entertained at dinner by C. H. Murphy, local dealer for the Buick and Chevrolet cars and distributor for Linn County for the Oldfield tire.

Early in the evening Mr. Murphy took Oldfield, R. R. Colby, of San Francisco, Pacific Coast distributor and Wm. Rogan, traveling representative for Oregon for a spin about the city and out into the country for aways. Oldfield commented upon the miles of paved streets over which he traveled, the fine appearance of the homes and business blocks, the good-looking churches, public library and other things of interest. He complimented Mr. Murphy upon his progressiveness in building a modern garage and stated that he had no idea that there was such a city here. Following the dinner at the Albany hotel he paid a fine compliment to Manager Bert Westbrook when he told Mr. Murphy that the meal was the best he had ever eaten in a hotel.

Barney—who is in his 44th year, proved to be a very ordinary citizen, although president of a tire factory and the best known racing driver in the world. He spoke humorously of his early experiences in the racing game and told of his troubles in getting his first racing car, built by Henry Ford, to go. There was trouble with the engine, he said, and it wouldn't work. The gas wouldn't feed. But the car was hauled by horses to the track the day of the Detroit races and in desperation a rubber hose was connected with the tank

and Barney sat on the back of the car and blew into it while Cooper drove. He forced in so much gas that Cooper tried to stop him, but they won the race and the much-needed \$200 that went with it.

Oldfield left last night for Portland where he will install a warehouse and distribution branch for Oregon.

**468 Earthquakes  
Felt By World  
In Last Year**

WASHINGTON—Four hundred and sixty-eight earthquakes were felt sensibly in various parts of the world during 1919. Of that number, 97 were felt in the United States but there was no loss of life or serious damage to property from those in this country. Of the earthquakes occurring in other parts of the world, loss of life was recorded in that of April 25 in San Salvador and one on June 29 in Florence, Italy.

Eighty of the 97 earth shocks recorded in the United States were reported from California. The remainder were felt in various parts of the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Kentucky, Arkansas, Utah, Arizona, Indiana, Illinois, Kansas (Tennessee, Washington, Virginia, New Jersey and Michigan all reported shocks during the year.

**Migratory Bee

**GOOD ROAD LOOSTERS

plea to stand behind the efforts of the court in the work of the 2,400 miles of roads in the county.

Senator R. A. Booth, of the State Highway Commission gave a survey of the work of the Highway Commission, dealing with the various phases of the work and the great value to the state the highway system would be when completed. Mr. Booth, in speaking of the relation of the country and the townman stated "The man who lives in the town and would not favor building roads leading into it would smite the hand that feeds him" "There are people who think the highway unnecessary and extravagance", said he, "but the state of Colorado receives an annual revenue from tourists 50 million per year and California about 100 million and if Oregon would could receive one fourth this amount from the travel attracted to our state it would soon pay the total expense of the cost of the roads under consideration."

Mr. Booth stated that the lowest bid on the pavement has been accepted in each case of 47 contracts let last year and that an average mile of paved road costs \$23,000. Every thing in the road program of the state leads to the development of the rural communities. Portland pays 36 percent; of the tax of the state and receives only the trade that these roads brings to the city, said the speaker.

L. J. Caulfield, engineer on the highway leading from Albany north to Jefferson was called on, who took as a slogan "make every day a booster day and to build good roads at a minimum cost."

Judge W. R. Bilyeu spoke on local matters of the county and stated that owing to the amount of money received from a 2½ mill tax and the double cost of labor and material the court could not carry out as much work as in former years. He presented a scheme to the members of the organization to present to the voters of the next election to place a three mill levy on the property of the county for road purposes in addition to the state and Federal money received, the 48 miles of market roads of the county and the usual repair work could be completed. His estimate was that \$18,000 per mile would build the roads of this county and that the road from Scio, Lebanon and Brownsville would be completed as market roads connecting with the state highway. Other speakers followed.

Rex Davis, of Harrisburg, was elected president, F. J. Miller, was elected vice-president and A. C. Schmitt re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Increase 241 Percent**

COLOGNE, The average daily wage of workmen in Germany has increased 241 percent, and of women 263 percent since 1914, according to the Imperial Worker's Gazette of Germany. The greatest increase was in the case of the electrical industry.
