DEPUTY EXALTED RULER VISITOR

Albany Lodge B. P. O. E. Inspected by Grand Officer, Growth is Noted

Albany Elks were honored by an official visit from Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler, Wilson S. Wiley, of Klamath Falls, as a special session of the order Saturday night. About 200 Elks were present representing every town of the county, also Eugene, Corvallis, McMinnville, Salem and Newport.

Deputy Wiley was tendered a royal reception by the members, and in turn gave a strong, patriotic and instructive address which was well received. The membership here is now 605 with enough candidates in sight to raise the total to 725. 174 members have been initiated since last April. Several candidates were initiated Saturday and a fine banquet served in honor of the occasion.

The next regular meeting is held on Thursday of this week, and the Annual Home-coming day will be celebrated on the first Thursday in next month, which is the big event of the year.

JOHN W. CHRIST DIES HERE SUNDAY

Well Known Restaurant Man Passes Away After Fight With Tuberculosis

John W. Christ, who, with his brother, James, conducted the Imperial restaurant, died Sunday afternoon at the family home two miles northwest of the city on the Corvallis road.

Mr. Christ had been ill with tuberculosis for the last 18 months, following an attack of influenza. He tried every means for relief and went to Arizona last fall for several weeks. He returned to Albany about three weeks ago.

He was born in Ergusky, near Tiflis, Russia, May 20, 1882. He came to the United States, landing at New York and coming west to Tacoma where he was employed in the Tacoma hotel for three or four years. In 1910 he came to Albany and, with his brother, James, bought out the Home Restaurant. Later they opened the Imperial restaurant, which they have been conducting up to the present.

Efforts are being made to secure a Russian priest from Seattle. If this is not possible one will come up from Portland to conduct the services in native language.

RIDDERS SELLS SHOP TO COUNTY

Auto Machine Shop to be Used For Truck Repair Plant

Ben Ridders, well known local machinist, Saturday sold the Albany Automobile and Machine Shop to Linn County. Mr. Ridders will retire from the garage business and devote his attention to the selling of Gary motor trucks.

The shops will be operated by the county court for the care and repair of auto trucks and road making machinery. Linn County is going into the roadmaking business on a large scale and an adequate repair department is necessary to keep the machinery in order.

Senate Committee Hears L. Martins

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—A. P.—After Ludwig Martins, self-styled Russian Soviet Ambassador to the United States had given a brief personal history of himself and his life to the Senate Committee investigation Bolshevik propaganda in the United States, it adjourned suddenly because the members had other pressing business engagements. Chairman Moses said that the committee will meet at his call, probably Wednesday.

One Killed, One Hurt in Accident On Motorcycle

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Jan. 19.—A. P.—Venada Carman, 14, was killed and Listene Barber, 20, suffered a broken leg when their motorcycle overturned after they had a tire blow-out on the highway between here and Cornelius. Both were residents here.

Deep Emotion in Holland Over Demand for Bill

Brussels, Jan. 19.—By A. P.—Deep emotion has been caused in Holland by the allied demand for the extradition of former emperor Wilhelm, of Germany. The belief is expressed that measures will be taken with the view of inducing him to voluntarily himself at the disposal of the allies.

Rhode Island To Test Validity of Prohibition Law

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—A. P.—The validity of the Federal prohibition constitutional amendment is to be determined by the Supreme court which today granted to Rhode Island permission to institute original proceedings to test it and enjoin its enforcement in that state.

CHARGES MADE BY ADMIRAL SIMS ON DEPARTMENT CAUSE OF STIR

Senate Naval Committee to Conduct Complete Investigation into Charges of Failure of Dept. to Cooperate.

WOODS TO TESTIFY

Assertion that Navy is Floating Death-trap Causes Inquiry; Daniels Defends Navy's Work.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 — By the Associated Press—Complete investigation of the charges made by Rear-Admiral Sims against the Navy Department's conduct of the war will be made by the sub-committee now inquiring into the award of naval decorations as soon as it completes its present task.

This announcement was made today by the full Senate Naval committee.

Investigations Must be Complete
WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 — Unless the Senate investigation of Rear Admiral Sims charges of the failure of the navy department to cooperate fully with the allies during the war is made to the entire satisfaction of the American people, an inquiry will be made by the naval board, Secretary Daniels announced today.

He added that "no organization in the history of the world ever did a better job than the United States Navy."

General Wood Must Answer
WASHINGTON, Jan. 19—Chairman Rutler, of the House Naval Committee, announced today that Major General Leonard Wood will be asked to appear before the sub-committee and explain his statement that the navy is a "floating death trap," made in a speech last night.

INJUNCTION AGAINST STRIKERS ISSUED

Work Held up on Government Contracts Charged; Leader Sentenced

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—A. P.—A temporary injunction restraining the employees of the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Co. from picketing the yards of the company here and at Alameda was issued out of the United States court here today. The company in its petition, said that government contracts were being suspended by picketing and other activities of the strikers.

Labor Leader Sentenced
WINNIPEG, Jan. 19.—R. B. Russell, a Winnipeg labor leader recently convicted of seditious conspiracy in connection with the general strike a year ago and sentenced to two years in jail, today lost his appeal when the Manitoba court of appeals unanimously decided that it could not review the case.

Sears' Brother Manages Large Furniture Plant

J. D. Sears, local grocer and baker, is in receipt of a copy of "Shop Notes" the house organ of the Showers Brothers Mfg. Co., of Bloomington, Ind. Showers brothers, the largest manufacturers of furniture in the country, are uncles of Mr. Sears and his mother, C. A. Sears, is General Superintendent of the plant. The company employs more than 2,700 people and conduct many side issues for the benefit of their workmen and their families, including a school, printing office and other departments. The factory is run on the co-operative plan, similar to the Ford Motor Co., and the employes share in the net profits of the business.

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
