Peace With Ukraine Reported WARSAW, Jan 19—Terms for con-cluding peace with the Bolsheviki have been fixed by the Ukranian government, according to Lemberg papers. They include the recognition of the independence of the Ukranian people republic: the exchange of products be tween Ukraine and Russia; the com plete neutrality of Ukraine and the withdrawal of all Soviet forces from Ukraine.

Merchants Cancel Shipment W. H. Hulbert, Albany; Chas. Sterl Because of Hgh Price, **But Handle Goods**

Reports were circulated Saturday to the effect that local grocers gere going to boycott the sugar manufacturers until the price of that staple became lower. This rumor was not founded entirely, however, for must of the merchants are keeping a supply

The report was probably started through the cancellation by Holloway's Farmer Store, Eastburn Bros., Holman and Jackson and C. O. Budlong of an order for two cars of sugar, the first of which was due here the first of this week. The dealers became alarmed and feared a drop in prite would be due soon and did not want to be caught with a large sup-

The present wholesale price of sugar in Portland is \$15.90 per hundred. The cost laid down in Albany is \$16.50 and the retail price is \$17.50. TO TESTIFY WOODS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 - By the Associated Press-Complete investigation of the charges made by Rear-Admiral Sims against the Navy Department's conduct of the war will be made by the sub-committee now inquiring into the award of naval decorations as soon as it completes its present

This announcement was made today by the full Senate Naval committee.

Investigations Must be Complete WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 - Unless the Senate investigation of Rear Ad-miral Sims charges of the failure of the navy department to cooperate fully with the allies during the war is nade to the entire satisfaction of the American people, an inquiry will be made by the naval board, Secretary Daniels announced today.

He added that "no organization in the history of the world ever did a better job than the United States Navy.
